International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow: The Baptism and Temptation of Jesus—Matt. 3, 13-14, 11.

Golden Text—"And lo, a voice from heaven saying, 'This is my beloved son in whom I am well pleased.'"

Jesus came, not to destroy the law, but to fulfill it; water of cleansing was used in his case, not for remission of sins. Jesus was sinless and pure. As Aaron was cleansed by water from the laver and anointed with the holy oil, so Jesus was baptized and then anointed with the Holy Spirit, visibly as a dove. His Father's voice out of the heavens endorsing His beloved Son (the Trinity) and our Lord endorsing John's commission as His forerunner. There being no new testament dispensation as to the mode of baptism, good and wise men differ on this point according to their preferences; but Jesus Christ, who knows the hearts of all men, baptizes every true penitent with the Holy Spirit, making no difference. Contrast the temptation in Eden that men might be as gods (rather than demons) to this in the wilderness of Jesus. God manifest in flesh as man. No soul will want food that feeds on God's word. Jesus knew God was His Father; Satan's "ifs" were useless though he quoted (rather misquoted) God's word.

John 7, 17—"If any man will hear the voice of the Son of Man, he shall know the doctrine," though Satan turn preacher; if you are elect you can't fail; try it, he says.

This act in this spiritual conflict—Satan suggests a false political act to universal empire, the real justifying the means. The kingdoms of this world are to be His, for the Lord God shall give unto Him the throne of His father David, and of His kingdom there shall be no end—Luke 1, 32. But Calvary first; no cross, no crown.

"To him that overcometh God giveth a crown, by faith we shall conquer though often cast down."
