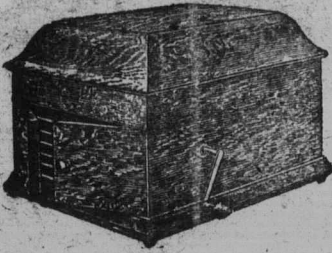

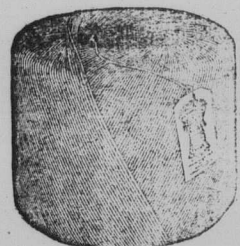

**LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO.**

With around 8000 head of new stuff the cattle market generally was dull and prices generally \$1 lower. The quality of the cattle was mostly medium and common. There is a fair demand for good and choice butcher cattle, heavy finished steers and good fat cows, at the lower prices.

The biggest decline was shown on the light weight butchers and green steers. Good butcher bulls sold at fair prices, but heavy, coarse bulls were very slow of sale.

For stockers and feeders the market was limited to a few choice breeder steers for milk cows and springers sales were slow and confined to the better classes of cows.

The outlook for the immediate is none

too favorable, excepting for the good quality stuff.

The market in the small stuff is away off, the best prices for choice calves running around from 15 to 16c and common 12 to 14c. Sheep are weak and slow of sale in fact are not wanted at all during the hot weather, and farmers would be well advised to keep them home for a while.

The hog market is holding steady, but the buyers are taking 18c f.o.b. and 19c fed and watered. The hog market, in fact, is about the only thing that looks anyway strong just now.
