The snow will be gone by the end of this month, but will come again in the middle of September. Mr. Wagner says he has prospected all through the mining camps of Southern British Columbia, and he has never seen richer or more promising surface showings than those on the bills in the grant of the country to look at the B. C., and from thence go to Republic. In speaking about Republic Major Leckie said he liked the place very well, and he felt certain that it was to be a large and important mining camp; this will be so, he said, because there will be several good mines there that never seen richer or more promising surface showings than those on the hills in the neighborhood of Hall creek. He thinks will be dividend payers. there is a large vein or mother lode which cuts across the country, and the small veins so far discovered all come from this.

Not much development work has been accomplished owing to want of proper transportation. At present it costs about \$50 a ton to get ore down to the Kaslo sampling works, but Mr. Wagner thinks that concentrating works will be estab-lished before long in this section, and probably smelting works. He says the railway construction parties of the Can-adian Pacific and the Great Northern are showing very careless methods in cutting and slashing down the timber as tney proceed and allowing the trees to float down the Dunean river. Owing to this many small boats have been wrecked, and last month the steamer Idaho was sunk by striking timber in the river. The government at great expense has cleared out and made the Duncan river navigable cally to have it choked up again by the logs that are cut and allowed to drift down from Duncan lake by the parties mentioned. The railway men in the construction or surveying camps are also very careless about their camp fires and in consequence bush fires are already raging all through that section of the country, causing an immense loss of timber to the province. The flies and mosquitoes are very bad just now, but Mr. Wagner says he will return to Hall creek shortly with a force of men to do assessment work, and probably more prospecting. The


