Whoever Composes.

We mentioned in our notice of the objects placed for exhibition in the North Hall of the Bonsecours Market, the plans, elevation and sections of the proposed Court House, the work, as we understood, of Mr. George Brown and Mr. Smith. We enquired anxiously for the plans of Mr. Ostell, which are said to be those chosen by the Government, and at last discovered, Mephisto of the end, that it was impossible to examine them.

In these, we see, no opportunity of obtaining a public exhibition of all these plans, so that the parties most interested in having a handsome and commodious building erected in this City for the purposes of the administration of justice, viz., the public, may have an opportunity of expressing their opinion in the matter.

We heard many persons, and those men who, from their actual attendance in the Courts of Law, have excellent opportunities of judging, express themselves loudly in favour of the excellent internal arrangements of Mr. Brown's plan, and, after all, that is more consequence in a building of this nature, than a mere handsome exterior.

We do not say, for how could we, no having seen them, that the arrangements in the plan chosen by Government are not as good, but that is precisely what the public want to know. It is not yet too late for submitting all these plans to public inspection, and we call on the Board of Works, if they do not wish to be suspected of jobbing and favoritism, at once to lay the plans before the public, and let opinion be expressed through its legitimate channel.

We before asked the question, has the opinion of the Judges, the Sheriff, the Prothonotaries, and the Bar been taken? We now again ask that question, and pause for a reply.

Public Announcements.

Thus ended the sports of the Fire Company, which would have afforded a great deal of amusement to our visitors, had the weather been more favorable.
