

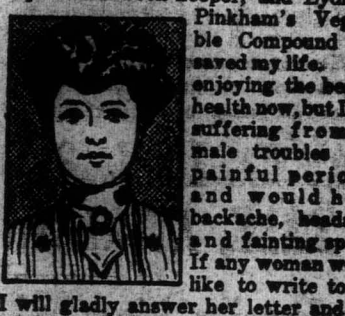

## SYLVIA PANKHURST DOES NOT ADMIRE ENGLISH PRISONS

### Issues Written Statement in Which She Tells Her Side of How Women Attendants and Doctors Make Her Eat.

LONDON, March 27.—The prison experiences of Sylvia Pankhurst, described in a statement issued by her last evening. Miss Pankhurst, who is the daughter of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the leader of the suffragettes, was released from Holloway prison on March 23. She was serving a term of two months imprisonment for window-smashing. Immediately on her incarceration she went on a hunger strike. After three days she was told she would be subjected to forcible feeding unless she consented to take food voluntarily. Six women attendants seized her and forced her down on the bed. "After this," says Miss Pankhurst, "the doctors came stealing in."

By the aid of steel instruments the doctors succeeded in prying her jaws apart, causing her great suffering. A tube was then forced down her throat.

"I was seized with severe nausea," she continued, "and after they had pulled the tube out they left me on the bed exhausted and shaking with sobbing. The same thing happened in the evening, but I was too tired to fight so long."

After two days of forcible feeding the prisoner was ordered to solitary confinement for refusing food. The forcible feeding continued daily.

After being imprisoned for twenty-six days she was allowed to exercise with Miss Zelic Emerson, of Jackson, Mich., who was also serving a two months term for window-smashing. Miss Emerson, too, was on a hunger strike.

"At first," says Miss Pankhurst, "I could hardly believe it was she—her figure was so much changed, only half the size it was when she entered the prison with me."

According to her account Miss Pankhurst by this time was a physical wreck—her eyes "like two cups of blood," her nerves shattered. She gave way frequently to fits of screaming and crying. Just when she had concluded that she could keep up the fight no longer the doctors held a consultation and decided to recommend her release on medical grounds.

## How to Help the Government

DO you read the preludes and foot notes in books, and the printed directions that come with the articles you buy?

If you are a woman, I don't believe you do. Nine women out of ten never glance at such things; men are more apt to do. There is a certain brand of canned peas which the whole neighborhood uses. The other evening when we were helping to prepare an impromptu tiffin at Molly's house, the Man-Who-Thinks was delegated to open a can of these peas. Before doing so he carefully perused the printed matter on the outside, and this is what he read:

"These peas are colored with copper sulphate."

"Goodness!" said Molly. "I never saw that before."

None of us had, and yet it had been there all the time, and we have been using that brand for years. Whether a small quantity of copper sulphate is harmful or not, we do not yet know. But whether it is or not, there is no question that we should have read what was written on that can.

We ought to be ashamed of ourselves, and so should all the women who do not take advantage of the protection which pure food legislation offers them. As you know, the pure food laws provide that when certain coloring matter and preservatives of questionable salubrity are used, this fact shall be stated on the can or box.

This the Government comes half way in protecting the individual from the dangers of impure food. But unless the individual efforts of the Government are useless.

To think that three-quarters of us are too careless, or too lazy, or too indifferent to do our part!

Isn't that a painful commentary on the American character?

In some of the little basement stores in the slums of the big cities, where violently colored sodas are dispensed for a penny a glass, the proprietors observe the law by boldly hanging above their fountains the sign, "This soda is highly adulterated." How do they dare to do it? Because they know that the poor ignorant folks will think that fine-sounding phrase means that the soda is extra good.

No doubt the manufacturers who supply us with our canned goods feel a similar confidence in our indifference to any warning they may print.

It is every woman's duty to do what she can to get good legislation, but we must not forget that we have a further duty, and that is to make the legislation we already have as effective as possible. And every woman can do that in this particular by reading the printed matter on the outside of all the goods that come into her kitchen.
