It was also reported that a large number of boys are interested in the industrial classes, and to further the interests of the industrial training, a letter was ordered to be sent to the parents of boys leaving the public schools, in order to interest them in the classes. The committee wish it to be known that the classes are for boys who are 14 years of age, and intend going into industrial life. A committee was appointed to answer all enquiries regarding the same, consisting of Messrs Burt, Mutter and Coles.
