BRANTFORD RESIDENT WAS LAID TO REST

Funeral of Late Mrs. Chas. Palmer Took Place Sunday at Paris

BAD ELECTRIC STORM Wm. H. Kipp Accidentally Killed By Machine Near Princeton

(From our own Correspondent) Paris, Sept. 4.—The funeral took place at Paris cemetery on Sunday afternoon of Elizabeth L., the widow of the late Chas. Palmer of Brantford Tp. Deceased, who was 69th year, was known to many in this section.

An unusual fierce electrical storm passed over Paris during the early hours of Sunday morning, accompanied by heavy rain, and east of the town quite a little hail storm lasted for a few minutes. In town a large double chimney on ex-Mayor H. Stronell's residence was struck and shattered, some of the bricks being thrown about fifty feet away. The valuable head of cattle on the farm of Mr. John P. Barker, Keg Lane, were killed, and a barn on R. Greenwood's farm in Brantford Tp., was burned to the ground, with some 20 loads of hay and several hundred bushels of grain.

The death took place on Saturday morning of Mrs. E. Anderson of Dundas St. Deceased came to Paris with her husband and daughter last year from Glenora. She was almost totally blind, and had been ill for some time. The funeral took place yesterday morning to door in some parlors being conducted by the officers of the local Salvation Army.

The unfortunate man, Mr. H. Kipp, of the Governor's Road, who was accidentally killed in a threshing accident near Princeton on Saturday, was well known Paris. His widow was a Miss Reading, who with a family of five children, survives. The eldest, twin boys, are 18 years, and the youngest a baby only three months old.

There is freely general complaint of the quantity of raw weed, sweet clover and golden rod, allowed by the authorities to grow on the streets. Parties suffering from hay fever can barely go outside their door in some portions of the town at Clarksville, along Willow street, as also Dundas and portions of River St., the raw weed is running wild.

Silos in Western Canada



Up-to-date Silo and Barn in the West.

FOR many years Western Canada has not been thought of as a silo country. The enormous areas of unoccupied land, on which cattle roamed at will, or the settler cut his year's supply of native hay, to a large extent met the fodder problems of the country. With closer settlement and more intensified agriculture, however, a change is coming about. Particularly on account of the rapid advance of the dairy industry the farmers are becoming more interested in the various means of caring for their herds, especially during the winter months. The silo has been found to solve one problem, and is making its appearance in many parts of the country. From experiments that have been undertaken at the various experimental farms it would appear that the silo method of feeding dairy stock is one of the very best. Superintendent G. H. Hutton, of the Dominion Experimental Farm at Lacombe Alberta, claims that winter silage is one of the best means of keeping the farm stock well fed during the winter and has solved the problem of securing succulent feed for the dairy cattle.

In his report Mr. Hutton says that the growing of roots has met with many objections among them being the high cost of labor and the difficulty of storing. Where these difficulties can be overcome roots add very materially to the rations for the dairy cow and are a means whereby the cost of production can be lowered to the "bone" or fractioning and maintained at a higher daily

average throughout the winter months. He believes that the solution lies in the silo since it can be erected at a comparatively low initial cost, considering the tons of material that can be stored, and considering also that silage can be made from peas and oats, or oats alone, a crop which can be universally and successfully grown and which will yield a green weight of from eight to twelve tons per acre. The crop intended for the silo is cut while the oats are in the milk stage and is at once run through the cutting box and cut as fine as possible, going into the silo absolutely green. It is important that the silage be thoroughly tramped. A silo 30 feet high and 12 feet in diameter will hold from 80 to 90 tons, according to the amount of moisture in the crop at the time it is cut. At the Lacombe Experimental Farm some bulky fodder, as hay or oat straw, is usually used in conjunction with the silage as well as the usual grain ration. When so fed cows on full flow of milk will consume around 40 pounds per day. Experiments which have been conducted at the farm during the past two years to determine the best method of silage as compared with the amount of moisture in the ordinary silage, very decidedly in favor of silage. The crop showing also a pound of butter of as much as four cents per pound, and as much as made from corn.
