Some soldiers then entered the park which had been closed to the public for four years. They smashed the marble slabs surrounding the beautiful ponds, broke their guns and threw the gun barrels in the water. They then formed a procession and singing the "Marselilaise," paraded through the city behind the red flag.

The only bloodshed in Brussels occurred on Monday when a patrol detailed by the soldiers' committee to keep order, fired upon a disorderly crowd, killing twelve civilians and wounding about thirty. The erowd had disregarded the firing of a blant volley by the soldiers.
