HOME RULER

Turkish Officers and Men Now on Furlough Ordered to Rejoin Their Regiments--British Lieutenant and Nine Bluejackets are Missing--Carnegie Gives a \$70,000 Library to Edmonton--Very Cold Weather Prevails in Winnipeg--A Whole Family Perish in a Fire--Man Has Fatal Fall From a Window.

GETS ORDERS TO LEAVE (Courier Leased Wire.) LONDON, Jan. 31.—The Turkish Government today sent orders to the Ottoman peace plenipotentiaries to leave London at once for the Turkish capital, according to a news agency despatch from Constantinople.

MILLION DOLLAR FIRE (Courier Leased Wire.) MEXICO, Jan. 31.—Many business houses and residences, as well as the shops of the United Railways and several warehouses were destroyed by fire last night. The loss is estimated at close to a million dollars.

24 BELOW IN WINNIPEG. (Courier Leased Wire.) WINNIPEG, Man., Jan. 31.—Last night at 5 o'clock the thermometer registered three below and this morning at 9 o'clock it was 24 below—a drop of 21 degrees in sixteen hours. At that time it was still falling and the prospects for cold weather are still mild and no place in it has as yet touched zero.

ORDERED TO JOIN THE REGIMENTS (Courier Leased Wire.) CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 31.—All the officers and men of the Turkish army now on furlough, have been ordered to rejoin the regiments within 24 hours.

NOTED MAN DEAD (Courier Leased Wire.) LONDON, Jan. 31.—Baron Hkett, distinguished member of the Liberal party in the House of Lords, died today at the age of 73. Before being created a peer he was well known as Sir Walter Foster. He served as parliamentary secretary to the local government board from 1892 to 1895.

A BLIZZARD (Courier Leased Wire.) DULUTH, Minn., Jan. 31.—A blizzard general over the Iron ranges and northwestern Wisconsin and Minnesota started last night and continued today in unabated fury. The temperature was close to zero and a 35 mile north wind was accompanied by fine hard snow.

PUBLIC OPINION

Throughout the Continent of Europe is Overwhelming on Behalf of Peace--The Latest Situation

LONDON, Jan. 31.—The overwhelming strength of public opinion throughout Europe in favor of peace in the Balkans is exercising a profound influence on the delegates in London of the allied Balkan states, and the European ambassadors here will, it is expected shortly make themselves the mouthpiece of this widespread sentiment to convince some of the more quiet spirits among the representatives of Bulgaria, Greece, Montenegro and Serbia.

THE SUICIDE

Of a Prominent Young New York Man in Winnipeg--His Father is a Very Wealthy Resident of Gotham

WINNIPEG, Jan. 31.—Twenty-four hours after he had cut his throat with a razor, the body of Eugene Delano, a member of a prominent New York family, residing at 12 Washington Square north, was found Thursday lying unclothed on the floor of his bedroom in the Royal Alexandra Hotel. He left a letter addressed to Eugene Delano, New York, which read: "Dear Father, Sisters and Brothers, forgive me. Eugene Delano, United States Consul-General in Winnipeg on Friday last. He was in good health and spirits and the family can assign no motive for his act. Eugene Delano was well known in club and athletic circles. His father is a member of the banking firm of Brown Brothers and Company and a director of the Bangor and Aroostook Railroad Company and of the Fourth National Bank. He has Canadian interests and it is supposed that the son went to Winnipeg in this connection."

EIGHT HOUR

Workingmen and Working Women Want This for Their Period of Daily Employment--Over Two Million Represented

LONDON, Jan. 31.—A resolution calling for an 8-hour day for all classes of workmen and work women was adopted today by the Trades Union Congress at which over 2,000,000 British working men and women are represented. The agitation for an 8-hour day without any overtime, has been in progress for some time, under the auspices of the parliamentary committee of the Trades Union Congress, whose intention is to secure an 8-hour day, or 48 hour week for every class of labor.

Catapults are the Latest Dodge of the British Suffragettes

(Courier Leased Wire.) LONDON, Jan. 31.—The British suffragettes have adopted the catapult as a weapon in their campaign. With it they hurl heavy leaden discs stamped with "votes for women." In consequence of the newness of the weapon, their aim is not very good, so the damage they have thus far caused has not been great. The disc, however, is said by doctors to be capable of killing a man. An actress named "Jackey" Melford, was charged at the police court this morning with bombarding shop windows with one of these catapults from the top of an omnibus. She was fined \$10 or a month's imprisonment. Her father, Mark Melford, a well-known actor, paid the fine. The suffragettes continue to set fire to the contents of the street letter boxes. Large numbers of letters were destroyed at various points this morning.
