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BROCKVILLE CHEESE BOARD.

SPECIAL REPORTER.

ASHWOOD HALL, Sept. 8, 1891.

We had the usual large attendance of gentlemen interested in the sale of this important line of merchandise. The market to-day was not what the salesmen had hoped to have. They had been looking forward to a ten cent market for fine goods. When Mr. Thompson, of Prescott, secured the choice of all goods chalked on bulletin board for 9 1/2c, there was a decided manifestation of disappointment in the camp. The buyers had orders but on much lower prices than those paid on previous week. They did not try very hard to get the goods and would not budge from first price made. 9 1/2c. was the high and low price for white or colored goods.

The offerings were 3,151 white, 2,280 colored, a total of 5,431. Of the sales made, Mr. Derbyshire secured 1,315, McDougall, 355, Thompson 380.

The special Liverpool cable reported cheese at 46 shillings, representing a very steady market in the old country.

It was reported that nearly all the offerings of the board were sold out after the rooms were closed.
