His brother clergy, of whom the writer is one, congratulate him on his promotion and have every expectation that he will be equally successful in the future in advancing the parishes of Hillier and Ameliasburg, as he has already been in the past in those parishes in which he has served."

Death of Moffatt F. Bresse

After a lingering illness, Moffatt F. Bresse died at his home near Addison on Monday last, aged 58 years. Honest and upright in all his dealings and possessed of good judgment, his business abilities were recognized and he was elected to a seat at the council board of the municipality, where he gave the same faithful, efficient service that characterized his own business operations.

The funeral service is taking place in the Methodist church to-day, conducted by the pastor of the Baptist church, Rev. L. M. Weeks, assisted by Rev. S. J. Hughes.

A LOCAL OPTION VOTE
