## URGES ON A TRADE WAR.

A Leading German Paper Wants Great Britain to Assist

In Teaching the United States a Lesso -Some Plain Larguage Used.

Berlin, February 28.-The Cologne Volks Zeitung, the leading Centrist organ, argues in favor of Germany maintaining a good understanding with England "in order to have frest hand against the United States," adding:

"We have hitherto shown the genlemen in Washington too much readiness to yield. We can only make them feel the full weight of our power er when England does not stand in the way. Of course nobody in Ger-many intends to provoke a war with the United States from which we would have nothing to gain; but the interests of our agriculture absolute-ly demand a more energetic assertion in Washington through the imperial government than they have hitherto had.
