HINTS FOR THE TEACHER

Leaving aside the abstract question of morat teaching in the schools as commodify discussed, the editor of the Ridgetown Dominion makes the following suggestion, which will be generally concurred in: "We believe that every Friday afternoon from 3.30 to 4 o'clock the teacher cannot be better employed in the service of the pupil, parent and state than in giving 'talks,' inculcating a proper respect for faw, order and property.
