### Jubilee Art Exhibition.

The Trustees of the OWENS ART INSTITUTION will hold an Exhibition of Art Talent of the Maritime Provinces, to be opened on the occasion of the celebration of the Jubilee of the reign of Our Gracious Queen. With that end in view, and with extensive wall and central space for display, the Trustees invite each and all professional and amateur Artists throughout the Maritime Provinces to contribute specimens of their work—Originals or Copies—in Oil, Water Colors, Crayon Drawings, or Penicillings, framed or unframed. In case it be desired by those interested in other lines of Art, a room will be set apart specially for the display of such work. It is hoped all will cheerfully join in this pictorial tribute of loyalty in honor of the Royal Lady, who, reigning in the hearts of her people, has for the past fifty years so gracefully filled the highest position in the empire; and they are requested to advise the Trustees at once (not later than June 1st) of their intention to do so, giving particulars of their proposed contributions. In order to give time for preparation, the Gallery, after the present week, and until the commencement of the Festival, will be closed, except from 3 to 5 p. m., for business purposes only.

The present School Exhibit having been kindly placed by the several owners at the disposal of the Trustees for the intended purpose, will no longer bear a distinctive character, but will be merged in the general Exhibition. The Oils will remain, as at present on the central display screen, and the Crayons will be removed to the School Room, in order to make space in the Gallery for the incoming Oils and Water Colors. Every care will be taken to avoid favoritism in the hanging, that process being governed by the effect upon the general display; and, as the object of the Exhibition is not competitive, but rather of a character to show, through individual productions, the general development of Art culture within the Provinces, no special critical test will be applied to the contributions when being hung.

It is hoped the material response to this invitation will be so general as to make the Exhibition not only creditable to the artistic development of the Maritime Provinces, but worthy of the great occasion to which it will owe its paternity. It starts with a nucleus of local talent—now in the Gallery—of 353 Oils, of which 310 are originals; 20 Water Colors, of which 6 are originals; 72 Crayon Drawings, of which 69 are originals; and to persons living at a distance it may be said, the Provincial Exhibit will have as an adjunct the display of the Institution, consisting of 285 Oils and Water Colors, of which number 278 are originals. Among these are works by Rembrandt, Gaspar Carlo Duky, Nicholas Poussin, Gaspard Pousin, Rubens, Sir Peter Leley, Sir Joshua Reynolds, Jean Francois Millet, Sir John Gilbert, Benjamin West, Elizabeth Thompson, Ary Scheffer, George Cattermole, William Etty, R. A., Thos. Moran, Anton Mauve, Copley Field, Jan Vander Heydon, Clarkson Stanfield, R. A., John Constable, R. A., Mary Field, R. A., Horace Vernet, Sir Edwin Landseer, R. A., J. R. Herbert, R. A., Geo. Frederic Pugin, R. A., Wm. Van der Auwera, Sir A. Colcott, R. A., D. Macdise, R. A., T. Sydney Cooper, R. A., Wm. Hunt, Joseph Claude Vernet, George Chambers, W. Mulready, R. A., with many others known to fame. Also Etchings by Machett, Seymour Haden, Lalanne Van Gravesand, Walther, Dupreneck, Walter Shirlaw, Debains, Whistler, and others of distinction; and also reproductions from Michael Angelo, Raphael, Corregio, Adria Del Sarto, Titian, Leonardo da Vinci, Vandyke, Albert Durer, Lorenzo de Credi, Rubens, Gaetano, Holbein, Greuze, Botticelli, and other celebrated old masters.

While the Trustees can promise their careful attention to the ordinary preservation of the pictures during the time they are in their possession, the probable receipts from admission fees do not warrant their assuming any responsibility for damage by fire or other casualty, nor for the expense of transit. It is intended to continue the exhibition for one month from its opening, during which period a book will be kept in the clerk's office in which will be inserted the price of any pictures exhibited, and a desire to sell; such information to be furnished only to persons naming the number of the picture, as catalogued, which they may wish to purchase. In case of a sale no commission will be charged. All contributions should be received at the Gallery not later than 1st June, each picture bearing the address of the exhibitor, its title, and stating whether original or copy.
