Next meeting in Temperance Hall Thursday, Nov. 7th, at 8.30 p. m. The meetings are always open to any who wish to become members.

On Sunday afternoon a meeting for children was held in the first Baptist church, which was packed to the doors.

An illustrated talk was given to the children on the use of alcohol and tobacco, by Mrs Burpee, of Woodstock.

After several other addresses, a song by the children preceded the reading of the pledge by Mrs Todd—who asked for signers. Over one hundred young people responded, and gave their names.

At the close of the evening services an immense audience filled the same church. Mrs Seymour of St. John—superintendent of Evangelistic work in the Maritime Union—addressed the meeting, and gave an account of the work done by the various unions in jail and prison work.

This very interesting address was a surprise to those unacquainted with the W. C. T. U., by the amount and variety of the work performed. Mrs Atkinson spoke of her own experience in visiting the prisoners. "Buck," who was executed for shooting the officer who arrested him while in the act of burglary, and under the influence of liquor. She said: "When I first heard of his conviction I held him close to God in prayer, but never thought of visiting him. But while the Lord was leading me to pray for him, He was preparing a way for me to visit him."

While Buck was raving and swearing and in a frenzy of passion at his sentence, a fellow prisoner told him he had better send for Mrs Atkinson. He said: "If she is a White Ribbon woman, I will follow her as the only one who care for such fellows as you are."

She visited him many times at his own request, and was with him at the hour of his execution. He professed a change of heart, which she told him that Jesus was genuine. When she told him that Jesus was his friend, he said he never knew that, but always thought God hated him. He told her how he was early left unprepared for on the street, and had received no training except for vice.

His parting advice to Mrs Atkinson was: "Oh, save the boys! Save the boys!" The Monday morning session was devoted to a school of methods. Excellent papers were read on Narcotics. Mathew's meetings and Press work. Each paper was followed by discussion, which drew out some valuable hints for workers.

A parliamentary drill and a question box, closed the meeting. In the afternoon a letter was read from Miss Stirling, lately of Aylesford, and former Co. Sept. of Kings. After relating some of the trials to which she had been subjected during last winter she made the following suggestion to all local unions. "That at every trial of a woman some white ribbon sister strive to be present at her examination, and in the court room, and that we petition the Legislature to make it illegal for the trial to proceed without the presence of a woman."

After some farewell addresses and several appropriate and finely rendered solos, the convention closed by the white ribbons forming a circle round the Hall and singing "God be with you till we meet again."


