The People's Forum.

To the Editor of the Acadian. DEAR ACADIAN,—I notice in your issue of last week in Mayor Thomson's statement regarding the Wolfville sub-scriptions to the sufferers by the Windsor fire that he says the amount was "raised principally from farmers." Will the Mayor be good enough to publish the list in full so the public can have an opportunity of seeing just who did contribute. I notice this has been done in other towns.

Board of Health Meeting.

A special meeting of the Board of Health was held on Monday evening at the town hall, at which the Mayor and Councillors, Chase, Bowler, Sawyer, Haley and the Recorder were present. The matter of offensive fertilizer stored in the town was discussed. It was reported that the nuisance on Locust avenue had in no way abated. After some time spent in discussing the situation it was finally resolved that the Wolfville Coal Co. be ordered to move, within two weeks, the fertilizer now stored on Locust avenue to some place approved by the Board of Health.

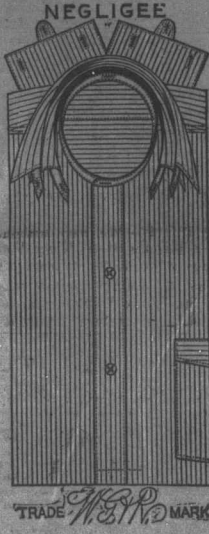
