Canning Items.

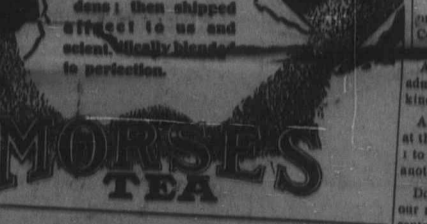
