THE COAL DIFFICULTY.

The high prices charged for coal in Nova Scotia are burdensome enough, but now it appears it will be supplemented by no coal at all, if the threat of Mr. MacLachlan, the Mine Worker's Champion be carried out. He claims that the British Empire Steel Corporation is charging exorbitant prices, to pay dividends on stock, which do not represent one dollar of real money. They are having a wage rate thrust upon them by a class of stock gamblers who have an insatiable greed for money, etc.

There is a very general belief that the coal owners of Nova Scotia have for many years been fixing the prices to suit their own pockets and not the pocket of the consumers. In this they seem to have been materially assisted by the Murray government. That mouldy institution has never published in its reports the costs of coal production and has in fact resisted any attempts made in the Assembly to get that information. As long as Mr. Murray withholds this information it is impossible to gain any truth of Mr. MacLachlan's assertions. The miners demand fair play; the consumers need it; the Montreal brokers should have it; let Mr. Murray now put the cards on the table; let there be no more suppression of facts that the people of Nova Scotia, who are supposed to own the Coal Mines ought to have had every year in their public reports.

NOT GOOD LAW ENFORCERS

In a former issue we referred at some length to the lamentable results of the non-enforcement of law, especially as it relates to the young people of a community. We pointed out that the effect of the open and unchallenged violation of even a town bylaw forbidding coasting on the public streets was to cause a contempt for all law and would in the end lead to the production of a very poor breed of citizenship. Another equally grievous error in our judgement is the appointment of those to enforce law who themselves have previously been serious offenders of the same law. We remember when a noted

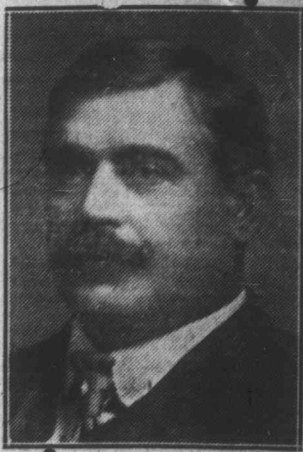
smuggler was employed to run down those who were violators of the customs laws and during late years similar instances of "Employing a thief to catch a thief" are not wanting. The system we have no hesitations in pronouncing bad and calculated to create a very damaging condition particularly among our young people. If in the public interest it is necessary to engage some one to protect a national resource or prevent the violation of any law the authorities should be careful to select for such service only those who themselves have not been transgressors if law and order is to receive the proper respect.
