ORGANIZATION IS NEARLY COMPLETE

For the Great Victory Loan Campaign in Carleton County

Chairman S. S. Miller of the Victory Loan Campaign is a busy man these days, giving his whole time to the organization of the parishes for the big drive soon to commence. He reports that the people are taking hold just as enthusiastically as they did a year ago and rightly seem to embrace the opportunity quite as much as a privilege as for a good sound investment as a patriotic duty.

Meetings have been held for Brighton front and back, and for Peel, Simonds and Wakefield, so that in a very few days the whole county will be thoroughly organized. Woodstock town is being energetically looked after by E. W. Mair, chairman, and a bunch of enthusiasts. Mr. Mair's big success as county chairman last year shows he knows how to organize and Woodstock is sure of going 'way over the top.

In Hartland W. D. Keith is chairman and C. D. Dickson secretary, while H. H. Hatfield, M. L. Hayward and Dr. Curtis are a committee to look after loans of \$5,000 and over. Coun. F. W. Smith is chairman of back Brighton and E. S. Estabrooks secretary. At the organization meeting at Rockland Mr. Miller announced that Coun. Smith had stated he intended to take \$10,000 of Victory Bonds himself. E. C. Morgan accompanied Mr. Miller to the organization meeting at Rockland and gave out what will probably be the campaign slogan: "Plan your work and work your plan."

It is probable that actual selling of bonds will not commence for several weeks, but the ground is being thoroughly prepared, and the allotment will no doubt be oversubscribed as it was last year. It is well to remember that Carleton county led the province last year, and that Brighton led the county. Let it be so again this year, except that every parish should attempt to carry the honors so far as loan per capita is concerned.

The exhibition room was beautifully decorated and all the exhibits were presented to the best advantage. This gave evidence of much care, work, and very keen effort.

A. D. McCulloch of the Department of Agriculture was present and judged the exhibits of the Pig and Poultry Clubs, which, in conjunction with the schools, displayed their products. Rev. E. A. Trites and C. S. Baker judged the other agricultural exhibits and Mrs. S. S. Miller and Miss Annie Davis appraised the merits of the other work of the Domestic Science and Home Efficiency departments.

SHALL IT BE "THE TOWN OF HARTLAND?"

Or Shall we Remain "One of Those Little Villages North of Woodstock?"

This is the last call to consider the question of town incorporation—or, more correctly, next to the last call. The pros and cons will be threshed out at a meeting in the Star Theatre tomorrow (Friday) evening, when every ratepayer of the district is proposed to incorporate should be present and state his reasons for, or his objections to the project.

The opponents of incorporation have been very active in a sort of subterranean canvass of late, and judging from the nature of the arguments their case seems a desperate one. Among the rankest of the canvasses advanced is that party politics inspires the incorporation propaganda and that the wicked Tories are at the bottom of it. It is true the "Tories" are wicked enough in all conscience, and it is true that some of these sinners are supporting the movement for incorporation. But, also, among those opposing are some who might be persuaded to renounce their religion but who will be Tory until they die. And among the supporters of incorporation are Grits with their haloes of sanctity in full bloom. So those who measure everything by party politics can get it both going and coming, but who nevertheless will find the spirit of Union Government still stands.

Seriously, unless at tomorrow night's meeting it can be shown that property holders on the outskirts will positively not be taxed for water and fire protection which they do not receive benefit of, the argument against incorporation, from their standpoint, is a sound one. If at the meeting the opponents can back up other canvasses made, their statements should receive serious consideration. It must not be forgotten that at the present time the ratepayers of the district proposed as the new town are paying one-third of the up-keep of all the roads in the parish—approximately 100 miles. If incorporated the same ratepayers would have to maintain only the roads of the town, at present less than four miles.

If incorporated the town need not employ policemen or any other salaried official, or install street lights or any other improvement. On the other hand if the people desire these things, incorporation will provide the machinery for securing them.

Town mayors and councillors receive no salary or other remuneration, but render their services gratuitously.

On Saturday every ratepayer should vote.
