## SPORTS OF THE DAY

### Four Days Big Racing at Fredericton Fair

The Official Programme of Races and the Complete List of Entries of the Stakes and Open Races—The Officials Who Will Be In Charge of the Meeting.

There are now over thirty race-horses quartered at the trotting park and others are coming in steadily, so that by to-morrow night there will be over fifty horses there and the accommodations will be taxed to their limit.

Yesterday afternoon Peter Carroll's string came in from Halifax by the 1 C. R. the last including Peachertina (2184), Warren Guy Jr. and Isard. Mr. Carroll, who is looked upon as one of the most able drivers who ever sat up behind a trotter or pacer in the provinces, arrives to-day.

This morning Frank Boutlier, the other well known and popular Halifax trainer, had his string arrive on a special train by 1 C. R. His lot includes Simassie (2084), the pride of Halifax horsemen; Kremella (2184), Major Wilkes (2204) and Ethel, a four year old.

This evening, or by special train to-morrow, the horses from Waterville, Me., are expected to arrive here. They will include the Brison, O'Neill, Kimball and Jackson strings, about twelve or fifteen horses in all. On Quiner's A and some others are expected by Star Line boat this evening.

#### The Official Programme.

#### Every Day a Big One

It will be seen by the above that the real big days will be on Monday when the two late closing stakes will be the programme and Wednesday when the Free for All and the 221 stake will be the card. But these races are not run on the one big plan, for every day will be a big one.

This morning Secretary Wilkinson received a letter from Secretary Gough of the National Trotting Association, stating that there were no practical against any of the Toronto owners or drivers at the coming meeting in this city.

#### The Halifax Entries.

The many horsemen who are here will be interested in the following announcement in the Halifax Recorder regarding the entries for the open classes at the Halifax races which follow the local Fair meeting:

"The entries for the Exhibition races promise great sport. The entries closed Tuesday, but those mailed up to 11 p. m., that day are eligible, and others are yet expected. There is a grand list, and only in the faster classes is there a paucity of entries. So far the 217 class has seven entries, the 219 and 220 ten each; 220 pace, 11; 222 trot and pace and 220 trot 8, and all the slower classes have excellent entry lists. The complete list will be published early in the week."
