Girl Shot Herself.

Boston, Aug. 31.—Fifteen-year-old Rose Annes shot herself in the breast and may die after she had been scolded by her parents. Four years ago her brother, 12, shot and killed himself.

Wife Held for Poisoning.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Aug. 31.—When chemical analysis revealed strychnine in the stomach of Joseph Nevil, of

Harvey's Lake, who died Thursday, Walter Vandemark, 30, formerly a boarder at Nevil's house, told the police Nevil had been murdered. Mrs. Nevil, who is in custody, refused to make any statement.

Fought Over Golf.

New York, Aug. 31.—Following an argument over priority rights at the first tee of the Van Cortlandt Park Golf Course, Adolph Hrudka went to the hospital with a broken head and William Furham to the police cells charged with striking Hrudka with a golf club.

Automobile Fatalities.

Washington, Aug. 31.—Automobile fatalities in a group of fifty-seven cities of the United States during the four weeks ending August 15th, totalled 328 as compared with 417 during the preceding four weeks' period. Nineteen persons were killed by motor cars in Massachusetts last week and 462 driving licenses were suspended or revoked.

Raid Boston's Chinatown.

Boston, Aug. 31.—Nineteen-one Chinese, 26 cases of liquor, 15 revolvers, opium and lottery tickets were captured by the police in a series of raids on Boston's Chinatown.

Montreal Hubby

Had a Sad Tale

Montreal, Aug. 31.—When asking for a separation from his wife, in court this morning, W. H. McClay said in part: "She was mad because I moved to the north end. She hit me on the shoulder, she kicked me on the shin, she spit in my face, she blackened my eye, she called me everything she could think of a beast, a brute—she said I could go to hell, she said she didn't care a damn for any of my Protestant friends." The case was taken under advisement.

BELIEVE MAN WAS
VICTIM FOUL PLAY

Toronto, Aug. 31.—The body of William E. Moore, aged 35, who lived with his father and sister at 88 Runnymede Road, was found floating in the Ottawa river at noon Saturday and relatives at Ottawa and in the city are convinced that he is the victim of foul play.
Although he is believed to have had money with him, nothing was found in his pockets when he was taken from the water, with the exception of an unmailed letter and a note book. Examination of the body by Dr. J. E. Young, of Ottawa, showed several bruises on the head, which might have been inflicted by a blow on the head or a blow coming in contact with logs on the river.
