## Anecdotes of Lincoln.

Mr. L. J. Cist has collected for a Cincinnati paper some interesting anecdotes of the married President. In 1852, when 29 years old, Lincoln was induced by his friends to run as a Whig candidate for the Legislature of Illinois. He was elected, and his maiden speech, as follows: "Gentlemen, Fellow-Citizens: I presume you all know who I am. I am a humble Abraham Lincoln. I have been solicited by many friends to become a candidate for the Legislature. My politics are short and sweet, like an old woman's dance. I am in favour of a national bank. I am in favour of the internal improvement system, and a protective tariff. These are my sentiments and political principles. If elected, I will be thankful, if not, it is all the same." He was not elected at that time.

There resided in Springfield, in 1860, an Irish laborer, John McCarthy by name, a red hat Democrat. Shortly after the Presidential election, Mr. Lincoln was walking past the Public Square, where John was at work cleaning out the gutter. As the President eluded the gutter, McCarthy, passing by, said, "Well, you are a fine fellow, you are, but I don't think you are a Democrat, are you? Faith, an' it wasn't by my vote you were elected, was it?" McCarthy, shaking hands very cordially, "the papers say that I'm elected, but it seems odd I should be when you are against me." "Give my compliments to Biddy, John, and tell her I'll think seriously of woman's suffrage," said Mr. Lincoln, with a smile, as he passed on to his office.

President Lincoln said that the best story he ever read in the papers about himself was this: "Two Quakers were travelling on the railroad, and were heard discussing the probability of results of the war." "I think," said one, "that Jefferson will succeed." "Why does that think so?" asked the other. "Because Jefferson is a praying man." "And so is Abraham Lincoln." "Yes, but Lincoln is only joking," doubtfully replied the first. After a State election in New York in which the Republican party was defeated, Mr. Lincoln was asked how he felt after having heard the news. He replied: "Somewhat like the boy in Kentucky who stubbed his toe while running to see his sweetheart. He said he was too big to cry and too badly hurt to laugh."

## Russia's Car.

HIS LIFE ATTEMPTED BY FIRE.

St. Petersburg, June 22.—The czar is living in complete seclusion at Peterhof.

The harbour is guarded by two gunboats and a torpedo boat, and the place by detachments of guards and Cossack patrols. He sees no one but members of his suit and ministers, and when he takes a walk he is accompanied by an escort. He looks weary and haggard.

The superstitious in St. Petersburg do not expect him to return alive. It is said, nihilists have been posted in the woods which almost surround the castle, and attempts have been made to fire both the woods and the castle.

However, the precautions to secure the czar's safety make it impossible for the nihilists to reach him. It is reported the czar recently remarked that his subjects in the mines had no reason to complain, seeing that he shared their captivity, and was at the mercy of a master more bloodthirsty than a Cossack. The czar is utterly broken down.

Two hundred police have been sent to Peterhof to assist the soldiers in watching the palace. Photographs of the railway officials have been lodged in the Government department to aid in the detection of nihilists disguised in the railway costume. strenuous efforts are being made to find the connecting links of evidence in order to give more unity to the trials of the numerous important political prisoners next autumn with whom the fortresses and prisons are crowded. It was observed in official circles that Russia cannot possibly make such an exhibition of herself before the world as to try a thousand or two political offenders, and as something must be

# done with all these prisoners to make room for others, the only way to dispose of them quietly and expeditiously is by the system of administrative deportation which Melikoff sought to abolish.

## Getting up steam on the C. P. in British Columbia.

A subscriber of the Telegraph at Port Yale, B. C., sends this interesting statement:—

Work on this end of the C. P. is progressing favourably, notwithstanding the fact that many Chinese are employed. Tracklaying has commenced at the Forest City, Emery, in good earnest. Not long since sufficient track being laid, the splendid locomotive, Yale No. 1, Gains Jones, fireman, was brought up in the company's private siding from the river and backed on to the main line. As the engine passed in front of the hotel, the colors on the pole of the hotel were dipped, which was acknowledged by a loud blow from the Yale, which echoed and reechoed through the canyons of the Fraser. This was steam first used on the Canadian Pacific in British Columbia.

## The St. John Country Market.

SATURDAY, 25th.—Meats, with the exception of mutton and lamb, which are scarce, were well supplied. Garden vegetables are quite plentiful. A few small lots of potatoes came to market during the middle of the week, but purchasers prefer the old ones, the present at least. Wild strawberries are moderately plentiful, selling at 20 cts. per quart. American cultivated are in less demand since native berries have come in. Gooseberries are obtained at 10 cts. per quart. There is little demand for turkey since spring chicken appeared, this week, 70 cts. per pair is the price asked. Peas and beans (imported) are selling at from 12 to 18 cts. per dozen. Roll butter 18 to 20 cts. per lb; packed is worth about 19 cts; cabbage 10 to 20 cts. per head and cauliflower from 30 to 35 cts; cucumbers range from 30 to 70 cts per dozen.

In the fish mart salmon, shad, halibut and lobsters were abundantly supplied during the week until yesterday, when there was a great dearth.

## Paris, June 27.—On Sunday afternoon Versailles was startled by the arrival of a detachment of Irish and Irish Americans from here to do honor to the memory of General Haiche, and to make an Anti-English manifestation. Among the numbers were James Stephens and Patrick Egan of the Land League, General McAdams and Reverend Mr. Pepper of Ohio. After 3 P.M. the crowd at the foot of Haiche's statue, purporting to be a tribute of grateful Ireland, and after listening to stirring poetic denunciation of the Sassanians from the pen of a young French poet, M. Robert, the detachment withdrew leaving the guardian of the place and French bystanders plunged in deep astonishment.

## Rome, June 24.—A Prelate will start next week on a confidential mission to the Pope to report on the true state of affairs.
