ARRIVAL OF THE CASKET.

ILL TO AMEND THE ACT RESPECTING THE DUTIES OF JUSTICES OF THE PEACE IN RELATION TO SUMMARY CONVICTIONS; ALSO AN ACT AMENDING THE ACT RESPECTING OFFENCES AGAINST THE PERSON.

DISCUSSION TOOK PLACE ON THE BILL TO EXTEND THE JURISDICTION OF THE MARITIME COURT OF ONTARIO, OBJECTION BEING TAKEN TO GRANTING THE MARITIME COURT JURISDICTION OVER ANY CLAIM FOR BUILDING, EQUIPPING OR REPAIRING ANY SHIP, OR FOR ANY NECESSARILY SUPPLIED. THE BILL STOOD OVER TILL MONDAY.

MITCHELL THOUGHT THE ADMIRALTY COURTS OF THE DOMINION SHOULD BE REMODELED.

MACDONALD, ON THE 11TH OF JANUARY BY HIS QUEBEC FRIENDS. THE BEAUTIFUL BOX, WHICH IS OF SILVER, WAS SHOWN TO SOME OF THE SUBSCRIBERS YESTERDAY, AND WHEN EXPRESSED THEIR ADMIRATION OF THE EXQUISITE WORKMANSHIP. THE FOLLOWING DESCRIPTION OF THE CASKET WILL BE FOUND CORRECT: OBLONG WITH ROUNDED CORNERS AND PROJECTING BASE, THE WHOLE COVERED BY FOUR BEARS, WHICH ARE SITTING ON THEIR HAUNCHES ON THE COVER STANDS A LARGE LEAVY PINE TRAILING LOG. THE SPACES AT THE ROUNDED CORNERS ARE FINELY CHASED WITH SUBJECTS AS FOLLOWS: 1st. A CANOE SHOOTING THE RAPIDS, 2nd SHOOTING SCENE, 3rd BEAVER DAM, 4th FOREST SCENE WITH DEER. AROUND THE EDGE OF COVER AND ROUND THE FOOT THERE ARE RICH BANDS OF MAPLE LEAVES. ON THE FRONT IS THE INSCRIPTION IN ENGLISH AND FRENCH UNDER AN ARCH OF WHICH TWO RAISED MOOSE HEADS FORM PART. ON THE BACK THE ARMS OF SIR JOHN A. MACDONALD IN VERY HIGH RELIEF, AND AT BOTH ENDS THE ARMS OF QUEBEC. THE ORNAMENTS ARE LENGTH 10 1/2 INCHES, WIDTH 7 INCHES—TOTAL HEIGHT 10 1/2 INCHES, THE WHOLE PARTLY FORMED BY ARTISTIC SKILL.

THE 14th JANUARY, 1885, ON THE 70th Anniversary of the Birth, and 40th year of his public life.

LONDON, Feb. 14.—Police Commissioner and Mr. Cox, who were in London for Newcastle, while endeavoring to prevent the recent dynamite explosion at Westminster hall, have received a number of valuable presents in recognition of their heroic efforts on that occasion. Gladstone has given each of the gallant officers £50 from the royal bounty fund. Sir Wm. Harcourt, home secretary, has given each £50. Sir James Ingham, the magistrate presiding at a Bow street police court, has presented each of the wounded officers with £20, and members of parliament have collected £500 for the benefit of the brave officers, while numerous private individuals have donated various sums of money for the same purpose.

ICE-BOUND.

A STEAMER'S PERILOUS POSITION.

HALIFAX, N. S., February 16.—The Halifax steamer Ripon City, fifteen days out from New York for Newcastle, arrived here to-night with her bows smashed by ice and leaking. On the seventh day out she ran into a field of ice, smashing her iron plates. She was surrounded by ice as far as the eye could reach, and was jammed in for four days. The crew effected temporary repairs and she then steamed through fifty miles of ice and got clear. The captain says they saw a great many monster icebergs, ranging to 1,000 feet long and 400 feet high. He believes a son mass of ice was seen to the north side of Sable Island in January with ice, which extends over to the Nova Scotia coast. Captain Jenkins says he never saw so much ice in his life.

A CANADIAN SCARE.

TORONTO, Feb. 11.—Great excitement was caused here yesterday morning by an alleged attempt to take the life of Lieut. Governor Robinson. It was known that the Lieut. Governor and Lady Robinson would leave their residence early in the morning and drive to the station to take the train for Brantford, where they had an engagement to officially open a new public institution. Just before the carriage left the residence Aide-de-Camp Geddie discovered a suspicious looking box imbedded in snow and ice in the road leading to the entrance of the grounds where the carriage had to pass. The box was found to contain a black substance, and a wire attached to it was extended to a distant part of the grounds. The box was handed to the police, who now pretend that it contained lamplight. It is thought they say this to throw discredit on the Nova Scotia case who are supposed to be connected with the affair.

THE CANADIAN BOATMAN WHO WERE WITH THE Nile expedition left Alexandria early home and will reach Canada early next month. General Wolsey highly compliments the rowers for their services.

Montreal is protesting against the manufacture of rugs, collected from all sources, into flocking for bedding and upholstery purposes. It appears that the rug so used are neither washed nor disinfected.

The officers of the garrison at Halifax offer a gold medal for the amateur five mile championship of the Maritime Provinces. The race is to be started at Sackville in the course of a month.

SEVENTEEN MEN KILLED.—LONDON, Feb. 16.—A terrific explosion occurred in the powder magazine at Gibraltar yesterday, killing seventeen men and doing considerable damage otherwise.

OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—Col. Williams has received a telegram from Gen. Wolsey dated to-day from Khartoum, stating that he (Wolsey) had communicated with the War Office about the offers of Canadian troops and that he hoped to see a Canadian force here at Khartoum before long.

DEPARTURE OF TROOPS.

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Materials for the 25 miles of the Suakin and Berber railway will be ready for shipment by the end of the week. The steamer Arab sailed from Southampton to-day with the first contingent of Suakin. It is understood that the men were to be sent to Suakin to witness the departure of the steamer.

LONDON, Feb. 17.—A convoy of wounded and invalid British soldiers, on the way from Suakin to Khartoum, encountered a party of Arabs. A hot fight ensued between the Arabs and escort, but it only lasted fifteen minutes. The Arabs were repulsed. The casualties on the British side were few and unimportant.

LONDON, Feb. 16.—On account of the train on the war establishment to furnish the Egyptian army, the government has found it necessary to release many soldiers who had been confined in prison for military offences.
