## J. H. KELLY HELD ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING AT ST. ALEXIS SUNDAY

Quebec Local Election Campaign Now in  
Full Swing in Bonaventure--Meetings  
Being Held Throughout County

## FATHER AND SON ARE DROWNED

William and Rodney Melan-  
son Lost Lives by Cap-  
sizing of Boat.

(Special to the Morning Graphic.) DORBY, Friday.—A telephone message has just been received containing news of a double drowning accident in the western end of the County. About 12.30 o'clock yesterday Wm. Melanson and his fifteen year old son Rodney, left French Beach, East Ferry, in a small flat bottomed boat to get a suitable mooring stone for their large fishing boat. They did not return during the afternoon as expected, and Mrs. Melanson and family feared an accident had happened.

Neighbors, nearly all of whom are experienced boatmen, immediately commenced to search for them, with the result that Mr. Melanson's boat was found bottom up near the shore on the east side of Petite Passage in the vicinity of Blackford's landing. Search was commenced at once for the bodies, but it is feared they have drifted in the Bay of Fundy by the flood tide, and will never be found.

Manitoba Franchise Act  
Also Receives Attention  
of Members.

(Special to the Morning Graphic.) MONTREAL, Monday. — In the House today Sir Frederick Borden denied some rumors in connection with the trial of Ross rifles. Replying to Foster, Hon. Mayor Says Only Luke-Warm Investigation
