### Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

## ELECTRIC POWER.

Competition of Electric Companies Thorold and Pelham.

(Special Despatch to the Times.) Thorold, Sept. 13.—The Welland Electric Company will enter the field in Thorold and Pelham township as a competitor for business with the Ridgeville Electric Light & Power Company, which has obtained a charter recently and has franchises from these municipalities. The Welland concern intend to have electric energy at Fonthill for distribution in Thorold and Pelham, and have a gang of forty men at work on the construction of the line. It is said that the Lincoln Company, of St. Catharines, which is the local name for the Cataract Company, of Hamilton, have turned over their Thorold and Pelham township business to this company.

## STABBED 13 TIMES

For Saving British Vessel From Being Blown Up.

Bremerton, Wash., Sept. 14.—Captain Thomas Phelan, of Kansas City, soldier of fortune, died yesterday in Bremerton, aged 76 years. While visiting in his native country, Ireland, many years ago, Phelan learned of a plot to blow up the British ship Queen, and warned the officers of the navy in time to prevent the execution of the plan. Following the exposure of this plot Phelan was requested to call at the office of O'Donovan Rossa, editor of the Irishman of New York. While in the office Phelan was stabbed 13 times and his arm was broken, but he recovered.

## DIED OF THIRST.

Found Remains of Two Men Lost in Death Valley.

Searching For Brother of Head of Sewing Machine Co.

Rhyolite, Nevada, Sept. 14.—The bodies of Emory Bodge and Tom Flanz, miners who perished of thirst while attempting to cross Death Valley, were found on Saturday, four miles west of Skiddoo, Calif., by members of the searching party scouring the desert for a brother of President Eldridge, of the National Sewing Machine Co., who has been lost for three weeks.

The men whose bodies were found lie Rhyolite late in August, and started across Death Valley, where the thermometer reaches 130 degrees in the shade during the summer months. They carried two canteens of water each, but this supply must have been exhausted before they had gone half way. Crazed by thirst they wandered about until they were overcome by the heat and lay down to die. Young Eldridge was attempting to reach this place from his mining claims on the Panamint range. He left his companions three weeks ago. Men from all the desert camps have searched the desert. The burro he took with him when he started across the valley was found a few days ago, but there was no other trace of the man.

## HELD RALLY IN DUNDAS.

The musical and literary programme consisted of an instrumental solo by Miss Ham; vocal solos by Miss Birdie Bowdler and Mr. Jeffries; a piano duet by Misses Vera and Hilja Hendry; a duet by Misses Grace Powell and Vere Thompson; and a recitation by Miss Kate Hyde. Afterwards refreshments were served, and a good social hour spent pleasantly. An invitation from the Central Methodist Church, Hamilton, to attend the district meeting on Monday evening next was received and accepted. The room was nicely decorated and a bouquet was ordered to be sent to Miss Frances Chamberlain, for years treasurer, at the Mountain Sanitarium.
