Master Will Forrier, West Wawanosh, who was for some time laid up at his uncle's Mr. S. D. Wellwood's, with blood poisoning, is able to get back home again.

Mr. H. M. Chesney, of Tuckersmith, is, we are sorry to learn, in very poor health just now. He is suffering from some affection of the stomach, and is at present in Seaford in attendance on a doctor there.

The many friends of Mrs. David Walker, of the Mill Road, Tuckersmith, and wife of the ex-Warden of Huron, will regret to learn of her severe illness. She has some kind of internal trouble, and her recovery is sorely hoped for.

C. J. Reading, of Bluevale, has purchased the grocery business, at H. H. Haddock's, Wingham. He will run the express and the telegraph office as well.

Mr. Thos. Livingstone, son of Mr. Livingston, of Hullett, left here on Tuesday last for Deloraine, Manitoba. He has two brothers in that vicinity, and goes to spy out the land.

In Morris, on Thursday of last week, Lauchlin Black passed to his reward at the ripe age of 86 years and was buried in Brussels cemetery on Saturday afternoon, Rev. G. B. Howie conducting the service.

As an evidence of the extensive business being done at the Broadford & Box furniture factory in Seaford, we may state that they have now on their books orders ahead for over ten car loads of furniture.

The other day an Ida Ferris, daughter of R. Ferris, Harlock, was coming down stairs she fell and broke one arm and dislocated the other. Medical assistance was procured and she is getting along first rate.

The lightning of Friday morning last struck a chimney on the house of Mr. Geo Hudie, Goderich Tp. shattering the same, and also injuring a couple of rooms. Mr. Hudie only had the house insured about a month ago.

Mr. Jacob Hunter, teacher at McGowan's school, near Blyth, has sent in his resignation, to take effect at the midsummer holidays. The said teacher's ambition is to have a Rev. prefixed to his name.

While some boys were bathing in the river at Wingham, on Sunday morning, one of them, Arthur Long, a tinsmith, aged 19, took a cramp and was drowned before assistance could be called. He was got out five minutes after, but it was too late—the boy was dead.

A young girl, daughter of Mr. Joseph Stanzel, Leadbury, was severely bitten on both her arms and legs by a dog. She was unable to leave her bed for several days. We hope she will soon be well. The vicious brute which attacked her was immediately destroyed.
