

AROUND THE CITY

FERRYMAN DROWNED.

An unfortunate drowning accident occurred in the river at Athabasca Landing on Monday, when John Pringle, ferryman of the landing, was drowned in the Athabasca River. He was crossing with the ferry at the time of the accident. When near the shore Pringle in some manner fell off the front end of the boat and was drowned. The remains have not yet been recovered.

MADE THROUGH PINE PASS.

Inspector McDonald, whose arrival at Fort Saskatchewan from Hazelton, B.C., Tuesday was announced in the Bulletin, made the trip with three cowboys and a cow on the trail for the purpose of winding up affairs in connection with the Edmonton to Athabasca trail. He left Hazelton on July 17th, with a pack train of twenty horses coming by way of the Pine Pass. On the way down at Fort McLeod he met a party of Indians who stated that three Edmonton parties had passed through Graham about the end of June on their way to the Hinton gold fields. Coming down the Pine pass they met the Muncey party, who spent last winter on the Grande Prairie, and were going across the Rockies on the look out for a suitable ranching settlement.

B.C. IS TO EXHIBIT.

While there is every prospect of a large entry in the various farmers' sections of the exhibition, not the least attractive items will be those which are for display only, and which for the most part will be on view in the curving galleries of the exhibition hall. The Y. V. Griffin Co. are putting up an exhibit which is sure to prove attractive, and a new basket manufactory will present a display of the manner in which their goods are made. Several others who have already secured space are the Edmonton Brewing and Malting Co., Campbell & Crawford, St. Albert Biscuit Co., J. E. Vannatta New Grubber, Willamson fruit store, Brackman-Ker and H. J. Hartley, candy manufacturers.

MADE A RECORD TRIP.

The new generator purchased from the Canadian Westinghouse Co. for the new power plant, and upon the quick arrival of which the operation of the street railway was later extended, has arrived in the city, and will be set up at once. The generator was shipped from Hazelton, B.C., on September 23rd over the Great Northern, and the Canadian Northern. The trip to this city was made in the exceptionally rapid time of thirteen days. This is one of the quickest shipments for a similar distance to Edmonton ever recorded, and is very gratifying to the local management of the Canadian Northern.

COURT IN THE NORTH.

His Honor Judge Noel, of the Wetaskiwin District Court, returned to the city on Tuesday, from the north, where he held the first sittings of the court ever held by a judge in that country. He was accompanied on his northern trip by Mr. J. H. Macdonald, secretary of the Agricultural Society, Edmonton. He induced Provincial Government to send a selected cabinet of fruit charges and a consignment of apples, under the supervision of W. H. Keary, Mayor.

TO HAVE ANOTHER HEARING.

The Monteville miners, employed by the Alberta Coal Company, of which George S. Montgomery is the manager, are not satisfied with the decision in their case before the Industrial Commission, and are asking for a second hearing. The action, however, was dismissed by the magistrate, after hearing the evidence for the prosecution alone. Another information has been laid by the solicitor for the Miners' Union, and on this occasion the Alberta Coal Company are made the defendants. It is probable that a hearing will take place before the end of the week.

NO CLUE TO ASSASSINATIONS.

The old man, Thomas Burns, who was brutally assaulted with an axe in the south-west end of Strathcona on Monday night, still lies in a semi-conscious condition at the point of death in the Strathcona Hospital. There has been no change in his condition since he was taken to the hospital and there appears to be little hope that he will survive the effects of his beating. There appears to be little clue to the identity of the assailant or assailants. Yesterday morning Chief of Police McCauley and a constable of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police left on a forty mile trip with the intention of making an arrest. They have not yet returned to the city. Meanwhile Sergeant-Detective Griffith, of the Edmonton police force, has been working on the case and spent yesterday today near the scene of the assault on Fourth street south, Strathcona.

TWO MORE PRISONERS.

Warden McCauley, of the Alberta penitentiary, has had two additions to his list of prisoners this week. On Sunday James Clark, of Regina, was brought to the penitentiary to serve a three-month sentence for stealing a watch and chain. Last evening a constable of the R. N. W. M. P. came up from McLeod with an Indian named South-Fale from the Blood Indian reserve, why was sentenced to four years imprisonment for horse stealing.

AFTER BETTER FREIGHT RATES.

Word has been received by the Edmonton board of trade from the board of railway commissioners to the effect that they are considering the application received from Edmonton for a raising of the board in this city to consider the question of excessive freight rates on coal shipped out of Edmonton on the C. N. R. and C. P. R. The date of the sitting will be announced later. The board of trade has notified E. W. Beatty, assistant solicitor of the C. P. R., at Montreal, and G. Huel, chief solicitor of the C. N. R., at Toronto, regarding their request for an adjustment of the freight rates on coal. The railways will be allowed ten days in which to file a reply to the complaint.

CALGARY ENGINEER'S CASE.

The appeal case of the city of Calgary against the decision of Mr. Justice Stuart in awarding five months salary to R. E. Spenkman, former city engineer of Calgary, for wrongful dismissal, without sufficient notice, was argued before the Supreme Court en-banc today. According to the evidence in the case Spenkman was engaged as city engineer of Calgary at a salary of \$2,500 per year. Last year he was dismissed with one month's notice, and he brought suit against the city for \$5,000 damages for wrongful dismissal, and claimed that he should have been given six months' notice. The judge held that the city was not liable for the damages, and that the plaintiff's claim for sufficient notice was a valid one, and granted him five months' salary. The city appealed the decision, and the case is now before the Supreme Court. The city is represented by R. B. Bennett, who is appearing for the defendants and appellants, occupied the whole of this morning with his argument and this afternoon P. J. Nolan is presenting the arguments for the plaintiff and respondent.

GRAIN FESTIVAL NOTES.

As the time for the Edmonton grain festival draws nearer the indications that it will be a splendid success become greater. Applications for space for exhibits are coming in rapidly and the number of exhibits will probably be large. Word was received this morning that a second exhibit of British Columbia fruit would be sent to the Edmonton fall exhibition. This is being sent from the Okanagan valley, one of the greatest fruit districts of the province. In the art department exhibit a distinction will be made in judging the exhibits between amateur and professional. Some very amusing communications are occasionally received from the board of trade office from people in various parts of the world. This week Secretary Hartley received a letter from a man in Oregon, asking for information about this part of Alberta. He stated that he had some thoughts of coming here to settle. He believed that before long there would be a bloody war between the United States and Canada. He stated that he was a soldier in the army, and he was wounded, and he believed Canada was just as gritty. Notwithstanding the great danger he believed he would come up here, and thought he would like to see the place. He sent a lengthy letter by a request for some information regarding the Edmonton district. He said he had started the letter in the morning and had just finished it in the evening. He felt first and true down as could write no more.

STRATHCONA CAR BARN SITE.

The city of Edmonton has completed the purchase through J. G. Tipton, Strathcona, of three lots in the south east corner of block 160, Strathcona, as a site for the car barn on the railway, on the south side of the river. The property is situated one block north of the present terminus of the line, and the price paid for the three lots is \$1,800. Plans for the car barn which are for the present, of a three car capacity, are being prepared, and tenders will be called for in the course of a few days. It is expected that the new building will be put in operation.

FIRST VISIT TO CITY.

R. E. Young, Dominion land surveyor, and superintendent of railway lands for the federal government, arrived in the city yesterday on his first visit to Edmonton, and is staying at the King Edward hotel. Mr. Young is making a visit to Edmonton to see for himself the conditions prevailing here. He is the author of "Canada's Fertile Northland," which is a compilation of the evidence of reliable men who are acquainted with the conditions in the north. This afternoon he will be driven around the city and district by A. G. Harrison, secretary of the Edmonton board of trade.

APPEAL CASES IN COURT.

The argument in an appeal case entered by the Canadian Northern railway was heard at the Supreme court on bane yesterday and this morning. This was an action brought by Charles and Alice Swan against the C. N. R. for damages to Alice Swan, who boarded a C. N. R. train at Lloydminster on the night of Oct. 28th, 1904. The plaintiff alleged that the platform was not lighted, thus causing the accident. The case was tried before Mr. Justice Stuart, and judgment given for the plaintiffs for \$1,310.50. The C. N. R. appealed the case. O. M. Biggar appeared for the defendants and appellants and C. F. Newell for the plaintiffs and respondents. This afternoon the argument is being heard in the appeal entered by Estelheid & Co., in their action against B. T. Myrum and Theo. B. Myrum, defendants, and Louis Madore, claimant, in the decision of Mr. Justice Stuart on August 19th, 1904. The action is over the disposition of an estate. O. M. Biggar is appearing for the plaintiffs and appellants, and B. H. Henderson for the defendants and respondents.
