### The Fogota Here.

The S. S. Fogota, Capt. B. Barbour, arrived here from the North-  
ward at 11.30 a.m. yesterday. She  
left here at 4 p.m. Tuesday, and going  
north for a while had a rough north-  
erly wind with a good lump of a sea  
which made the passengers sick for a  
while. Coming and going, however,  
the weather was on the whole beau-  
tiful. She reached Change Islands  
Thursday night last at 9.30, and left  
to return at 11 o'clock. She made all  
her ports of call. She brought a full  
cargo of 550 pkgs containing mostly  
fish, oil and lobsters, and had one of  
the largest passenger lists since  
these boats have been running. The

### Arrivals from Labrador.

We hear by the Fogota that Capt.  
Geo. Blackwood, of Carmanville, who  
was down as far as Makovik, returned  
there a couple of days ago with his  
share of fish for one trap, in his schr.  
of 50 tons. She reports no fish down  
in that section. Five schooners had  
arrived at Elliston from Labrador on  
Saturday with fares ranging from 90  
to 150 qts.; one vessel hauling for  
200 qts. This fish was mostly caught  
with hook and line.

### Fogota's Fishery News

From Capt. Barbour of the Fogota  
we learn that the fishery around  
Fogota district still remains very poor.  
At Change Islands, Fogota, Joe Batt's  
Arm and Tilton they only get a half  
quintal per man by "hard scraping,"  
bait being very scarce. Then men  
get on the grounds on about an av-  
erage of four days out of each week,  
and the average ashore for each place  
is about 30 quintals to date. Traps  
did nothing at all. Already the men  
are leaving this section to try and  
get employment, and the Fogota  
brought up 30 from the Wadhams for  
Bonavista and Catalina to seek em-  
ployment on the branch railway.  
Practically nothing is being done now  
at the Wadhams and most of the men  
are giving up the voyage. At Bona-  
vista, Elliston and Catalina, where  
there was a spurt about a week ago,  
there is a great falling off and last  
week the hook and liners only secured  
about 1 qt. per day.

### House Destroyed by Fire at Safe Harbor.

By the Fogota we learn that a dis-  
astrous fire occurred at Safe Harbor,  
near Pool's Island, on Tuesday last,  
culminating in the destruction of the  
residence of Mr. Kenneth Knee of  
that place. The fire occurred at 6  
p.m. while a high wind was blowing.  
Mr. Knee with his whole family had  
removed some time previously to  
Millertown, where all are engaged  
working, and his wife came out to  
get together all their effects to trans-  
fer them to the Dundee to be taken  
to Millertown. This she accomplish-  
ed and then closed up the house. The  
woman had just got into the boat to  
go to the steamer when the house  
was discovered to be in flames. The  
people rallied round to try and save  
it but the fire had too much headway  
and in less than an hour the erection,  
a two storey V roofed house, was a  
mass of ruins. Our informants say  
that the house was fully covered by  
insurance. It is not known how the  
fire originated. Magistrate Millin is  
making a thorough investigation.

### Laughing May Cause Death.

By the schr. Campania, which ar-  
rived from Placentia yesterday, we  
learn of a rather strange happening  
which occurred there last week. Mrs.  
Jas. Bindon, whose husband keeps a  
store there, attended the wedding of  
Mr. Joseph Fitzgibbon, where a merry  
party had assembled. During the fes-  
tivities funny stories were related and  
good jokes were heard, and so heart-  
ily did Mrs. Bindon laugh that she  
burst a blood vessel. Since she has  
had several hemorrhages daily, has  
nearly lost all the blood in her body  
and is being attended by Dr. McKen-  
drick. When the vessel left the un-  
fortunate woman was said to be in a  
dying condition. Mr. and Mrs. Bindon  
are well known here, having resided  
in St. John's for years, and Mrs. Bin-  
don's friends will be sorry to hear of  
her condition.

### Boys Cause Runaway.

Saturday evening two boys climbed  
into Mr. P. Walsh's wagon at Angel  
Place and whipping the horse sudden-  
ly caused the animal to take flight.  
It went at breakneck speed down  
Alexander Street, and all who saw  
them thought the boys would be kil-  
led. The horse crossed Water Street  
and dashing into a tree box wrecked  
the wagon and left it there. It then  
ran west to its stable on Topsail  
Road. Both boys were thrown out  
when the wagon struck the tree box  
and how they escaped death is a  
mystery. One was badly cut about  
the face and head and had to be  
treated by a doctor, while the other  
escaped with some bruises. The horse  
was severely injured about the chest  
and shoulders. The animal cannot be  
used for some time and this will be  
a great loss to the owner.

### The Amethyst Here.

Saturday, after a run of 9 days from

### Dropped Dead in Dory

The schr. Amie B., of Placentia,  
Capt. Andrew Miller, which arrived  
here from St. Lawrence Saturday after-  
noon, reports that last week a  
large Lunenburg banker of 20 dorles  
arrived there from the Grand Banks  
reporting the death of one of her  
crew, a native of La Have. The man  
went out to overhaul the trawls alone  
in his dory at 10 a.m., and was seen  
suddenly throw up his hands and  
fall in the bottom of the boat. Know-  
ing that something was wrong a dory  
with two men in it was sent out af-  
ter him and found him dead in his  
dory. Heart disease was the cause  
of his demise. On the arrival of the  
vessel at St. Lawrence the man, who  
was young and single, was buried  
there. His friends were advised of  
his death by telegraph.

### Dying in Boston.

John Kavanagh, son of Mr. Cor-  
nelius Kavanagh, fireman of the  
Western Station, a fine able young  
chap of 20 years of age, has been in  
Boston the past year, and almost  
every mail his father had a letter  
from him. Thursday he wrote his  
father saying he was well, and by  
Saturday's mail Mr. Kavanagh had a  
letter from him in which he said that  
he was getting an advance from \$14  
to \$20 per week at his work on the  
elevated railroad. About an hour  
after the receipt of the letter Mr.  
Kavanagh received a telegram from  
his sister-in-law, Mrs. Lucy Gosse,  
stating that Jack was dying, and ask-  
ing for instructions. No particulars  
as to what had occurred to him were  
given, and the father wired for fur-  
ther information. He received an-  
other message on Saturday night  
saying that the lad was in hospital,  
but giving no particulars as to his  
condition or its cause. It is feared  
he was the victim of an accident. Mr.  
Kavanagh is in an agony of suspense,  
and hopes to hear more as to his son's  
condition to-day.

### Wayward Youth Shoots Father & Sister

New York, Aug. 28.—Returning to  
the home from which he had been  
sent away a week before, Frank All-  
gier, Jr., eighteen years old, son of a  
hotel proprietor at No. 114 Wyckoff  
Avenue, Ridgewood, rushed last night  
into the room where his family was  
at dinner and shot his father twice,  
inflicting wounds that probably will  
prove fatal. He fired two other shots,  
one bullet injuring the ankle of a lit-  
tle sister. The girl had attempted to  
keep him from using the revolver.  
His mother and a younger brother  
seized and held the youth until the  
police arrived.

### HOW TO WASH WINDOWS

Strange as it may seem, there is a  
right and wrong way to wash win-  
dows, and as this operation is usually  
dreaded, the following method will be  
appreciated, as it saves both time and  
labor. Choose a dull day, or at least  
a time when the sun is not shining on  
the windows, for when the sun shines  
on the window it causes it to be dry  
streaked, no matter how much it is  
rubbed. Take a painter's brush and  
dust them inside and out, washing all  
the woodwork inside before touching  
the glass.  
The latter must be washed slowly

in warm water, diluted with ammonia  
—do not use soap. Use a small cloth  
with a pointed stick to get the dust  
out of the corners; wipe dry with a  
soft piece of cotton cloth—do not use  
linen, as it makes the glass lumpy  
when dry. Polish with tissue paper  
or old newspaper. You will find that  
this can be done in half the time  
taken where soap is used, and the re-  
sult will be bright windows.— From  
the Storekeeper.
