House Destroyed by Fire at Safe Harbor.

By the Fogota we learn that a dis strous fire occurred at Safe Harbor, near Pool's Island, on Tuesday last, culminating in the destruction of the residence of Mr. Kenneth Knee of that place. The fire occurred at 6 p.m. while a high wind was blowing. Mr. Knee with his whole family had removed some time previously to Millertown, where all are engaged working, and his wife came out to get together all their effects to transfer them to the Dundee to be taken to Millertown. This she accomplished and then closed up the house. The woman had just got into the boat to go to the steamer when the house was discovered to be in flames. The people rallied round to try and save it but the fire had too much headway and in less than an hour the erection, a two storey V roofed house, was a mass of ruins. Our informants say that the house was fully covered by insurance. It is not known how the fire originated. Magistrate Mifflin is making a thorough investigation.

Since she has had several hemorrhages daily, has nearly lost all the blood in her body and is being attended by Dr. McKendrick. When the vessel left the unfortunate woman was said to be in a dying condition. Mr. and Mrs. Bindon are well known here, having resided in St. John's for years, and Mrs. Bindon's friends will be sorry to hear of her condition.

Wayward Youth Shoots Father & Sister

New York, Aug. 28.-Returning to the home from which he had been sent away a week before, Frank Allgier, jr., eighteen years old, son of a hotel proprietor at No. 114 Wyckoff Avenue, Ridgewood, rushed last night into the room where his family was at dinner and shot his father twice, inflicting wounds that probably will prove fatal. He fired two other shots, the glass. one bullet injuring the ankle of a litful Stitches, Sluggish Liver and all the sister. The girl had attempted to keep him from using the revolver. His mother and a younger brother seized and held the youth until the nolice arrived

The boy had been wayward, according to the other members of the family, and had been passing much time back of the bar, drinking and giving away drinks to his companions. Then the father decided to act.

"Get out of here and stay away." Allgier said to his son. "I will have nothing more to do with you."

Nothing more was seen of the boy until last night, when he walked into the dining room. The father was unrelenting and said, "I thought I told you to stay away." Then the boy pulled from his pocket a large revolver, and, standing only a few feet away, fired two shots. One bullet took effect in his father's abdomen and the other in the groin, and Allgier sank from his chair to the floor.

Margaret Allgier, fourteen years old, was the first one of the family to get to the side of her father. Her brother was swaying back and forth

"Oh, Frank, see what you have done," the girl cried, and she kneeled by the side of the wounded man. Don't shoot again."

As she spoke the youth pulled the trigger twice, one shot going wild and the other hitting the girl. She fell on the floor by the side of her father. Then Mrs. Allgier and another son, Joseph, sixteen years old, threw themselves on the frenzied young

The three fought half way around the room, the mother with her arms clasped tightly around the son, who was trying to release himself, while the other boy was doing all he could to make his brother surrender the weapon. The mother was so exhausted from shock and the struggle that she could hardly stand when Policemen Hart and Habuenrich, of the Hamburg Avenue station, who had heard the shots, broke into the room.
