Ploughing Through Amendments.

LONDON, To-Day. Yesterday the session of the House was again continued to the small hours of the morning. It was notable for the reason of the Prime Minister invoking the so-called "Kangaroo" clause of the procedure, whereby whole pages of amendments of the Parliament Bill for the curtailment of the powers of the House of Lords can be skipped at the Chairman's disretion. An important amendment, proposing a joint session of the two houses in cases of disagreement was opposed by Premier Asquith on the ground that such a plan would always give the House of Lords the last word in legislation. In his opinion it would be impossible to devise a scheme which would not place the representative body at the mercy of the Second Chamber. This amendment and another proposing instead of a joint session a conference of ten members in each house, were both rejected by large majorities. Five days ago he threatened her. This morning he roke into her room and killed her Jeanne Bochelier had a room in the Rue des Gravilliers, near the Bouleward St. Martin. At half-past seven this morning there was a knock at her door. It was too early for the post, and when, in answer to her cry "Who is there?" she heard her hus

it, and heaped chairs on it. She was mad with fear, and she had reason to be frightened. She rushed to the window. Her husband thundered on the door, and ther smashed a panel, tore out another and clambered into the room over the barricade.

brated. In the church Bochelier knocked down two men who tried to lay hands on him, stabbed the beadle in the face, and escaped through a side door

New York, April 15.-The Post's London special says: "London looked curiously continental this Good Friday, owing to the brilliant south European weather, the closed shops, the holiday dresses and the influx of dusky foreigners, but principally owing to the extraordinary religious street procession which wended its way from Trafalgar Square to St. Paul's Cathedral.
