Huerta's Government is Crumbling.

Special to The Evening Telegram.

WASHINGTON, To-day.

The Washington Government believes the power of Huerta is slowly crumbling and disintegrating. No positive steps have been taken by the Administration here within the last few days to compel compliance with the demand for the elimination of Huerta. No preparations have been made for the blockade of the Mexican ports; such as has been reported. Foreign interests generally will be represented by the States. At Tuxpan in particular special efforts will be made to protect British interests, pending the arrival of British cruisers. The sending of British ships is in line with the previous notification. The States regarded as normal the move taken for emergencies such as exist at Tuxpan, and it is intended to have a sobering effect on those constitutional officers, who, according to official reports, announced their hostility to English interests. The landing of marines has not been found necessary; so far no instructions to that effect have been sent, nor has there been any request for such instructions; meantime Admiral Fletcher is instructed to take whatever steps he thinks necessary to protect all foreign interests. Parleys with the Constitutionalists have been carried on in

no formal way, but merely for formative purposes. Administration, though not condoning inhumanity and armed strife generally in Mexico are inclined to view with some complacency the reprisals by Constitutionalists on the Federals and on those officers and men who have been deserting from side to side. These salient facts were obtained from those with whom President Wilson discussed the Mexican situation. The impression, that the Huerta Government is fast losing control over the territory hitherto dominated by it, is based on the dispatches of the State Department which show also that diplomatic pressure from without is having much to do with weakening the resources of the Provisional Government. There was some emphasizing of the denial emanating from the White House that any steps of a summary character had been taken through the instructions of General O'Shaughnessy within last few days. The President made it clear beyond what had already been published, there were no moves in the situation, as far as the States are concerned which are unknown to the public. The President holds view that as a result of all the influences now at work, Huerta will slowly but inevitably be compelled to yield to the force of circumstances and retire.

Huerta Will Accept Decision of Congress.

WASHINGTON, To-day.

The eyes of official Washington were turned yesterday on the Mexican Congress and on Huerta's message of his recent assumption of dictatorial powers. Those who have been of opinion that Huerta would retire after his acts had been ratified by Congress, still held confidence in their theory. So far as can be learned, the American Government means to continue its plan of a financial blockade with diplomatic pressure from without. In the closing feature of Huerta's message, which after proposing the sanction of Congress, he added, if this was withheld and authority entrusted to another, he and his ministers were agreed in advance to accept, such a result was regarded by some as an indication that Huerta himself was at last recognizing the possibilities of his own elimination.

Asquith's Offer Delayed.

LONDON, To-day.

Premier Asquith's compromise offered to the Opposition leaders on the Home Rule Bill is being delayed, according to the Daily Mail, by a serious discussion within the Cabinet regarding the solution of the question. Winston Spencer Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, David Lloyd George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Edward Grey, Secretary of Foreign Affairs; Viscount Haldane, Lord High Chancellor, the Daily Mail says favor the exclusion of Ulster from

the Bill, while Augustine Birrell, Chief Secretary for Ireland; Reginald McKenna, Home Secretary; Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Agriculture, belong to what may be called the Fighting Party, which will resist the exclusion of Ulster and are only willing to confer small concessions and are ready to impose Home Rule by force of arms. It need only be said, adds the Mail, that the Ulster volunteers force now numbers 90,000 men who are armed with 38,000 rifles and are obtaining more daily. Meanwhile Asquith does not show his hand. He is waiting developments.

Iron Ore.

E. C. Eckels, a geologist, giving his testimony in the United States steel hearing, furnished some interesting data on the Newfoundland and Nova Scotia ore deposits. He said that the ore had been located at 1,071 feet below the bottom of Conception Bay, and that the Nova Scotia Iron & Steel Co. is now successfully operating submarine mines. The economically workable ore within five miles of Bell Island is estimated at 3,500,000,000 tons. Besides this, there are billions of tons which are not economically available at this time. In one deposit alone in the Newfoundland district the witness said that the ore runs 30 feet thick and contains about 90,000,000 tons to the square mile.

Mr. Eckels estimated that ore could be brought from the Newfoundland mines to Philadelphia and the eastern steel market at a cost of about four cents per unit. Foreign ore sells at Philadelphia at seven and one-half cents per unit, showing the profit on the Newfoundland ore at Philadelphia and Baltimore. Lake Superior ore cannot be laid down at Baltimore and Philadelphia for less than nine cents per unit, according to the witness, or from two to two and one-half cents per unit more than the foreign product.—Canadian Mining Journal.

See Things Upside Down.

Boy with Inverted Brain Puzzle to London Surgeons.

London, Nov. 3.—A boy with an inverted brain has recently been discovered in a Durham school. He sees everything upside down, writes from the right to left; inverts letters and figures, and copies objects the wrong way.

The boy's teacher says that not only does he write upside down, but that he also sees upside down. For instance, if he has to write a small "h," the result is a "y," written backwards. That is to say, he commences to form letters at the tail-end, and works backwards. The same operation takes place when he frames such letters as "u" and "m," the effect being that the letters written are "n" and "w" respectively. His mind acts in a similar topsy-turvy manner when he is set to copy and figure on outline drawing.

His reading, however, is not affected by the peculiarity of his brain. Though it is evident that he sees the letters upside down, they make apparently the same impression on his mind as an ordinary boy. He can read words with as much facility as any other child of a similar age.

Every effort has been made to alter his abnormal method, but without success. Experts who examined an American boy recently found to be in the same condition, came to the conclusion that his mind and sight are as a camera lens, where everything is reflected upside down, and that is considered to be the explanation in the Durham case.

KITCHEN WRINKLES.

To remove fruit stains from the hands rub them with the juice of a tomato.

Cauliflowers should be boiled with the stalk uppermost to prevent the scum from discolouring the flower.

To prevent mould from forming on top of the liquid in which pickles are kept, put in a few pieces of horse-radish root.

When making a boiled pudding be sure to fill the basin quite full, otherwise the water will get in and the pudding will be heavy.

A cup of moderately strong tea in which two or three slices of lemon have been infused, will frequently cure a nervous headache.

When making roly-poly sprinkle a few bread-crumbs over the paste before the jam is spread. This will prevent the jam boiling out.

The deposit which settles round a goldfish bowl and is so difficult to remove speedily vanishes if it is rubbed with a cloth dipped in vinegar.

If your feet are blistered from long walking rub them before you go to bed with alcohol mixed with tallow dropped from a tallow candle into the palm of the hand.

Two or three lumps of sugar placed in kettles and teapots will absorb all moisture and will prevent rust and the rusty smell which is the result of their being left half dry.

When making apple pie the flavor is much improved, and the apples will keep in good color, if a few drops of lemon juice are squeezed over the apples just before the crust is put on.

Before frying the bacon for breakfast, cut off the rind, and dip each rasher in flour, then fry or grill quickly. This prevents the fat from running, and gives the bacon a better flavor.

When the top of your silver inkstand is covered with ink and you want to clean it, mix a little chloride of lime into a paste with water, rub the silver top smartly, and it will be brighter than ever.

Put all your potato peelings into an old tin, and bake them in the oven until they are crisp. When you lay the fire put them amongst the paper with a few sticks, and you will find that the fire will burn up very quickly.

An ordinary pie-chimney in the centre of a pan of milk prevents it boiling over. When coming to boiling point it goes so through the little chimney, and there is not the slightest chance of the milk boiling over the stove.

SUFFERING FROM BLOOD POISONING.—Miss Taylor, a popular young lady of Knowling's West End dry goods store, is confined to her home suffering from a slight attack of blood-poisoning as the result of a scratch on the arm received a little while ago.
