BEOTHIC FIRST

Home From the Icefields -- Reports for 26,000.

The s.s. Beothic, Capt. Wm. Winsor, arrived from the northern sealfishery at 1.15 p.m. to-day, hailing for 26,000 prime seals. Capt. Winsor reports that he got the majority of his catch in the vicinity of the Gray Islands. The weather was terrific during the spring and the "ice" was the worse and heaviest in my experience," said Capt. Winsor. The Beothic has none of the Newfoundland's crew on board. All Capt. Winsor was able to say of the awful marine disaster was that eight bodies could not be found. Speaking of Tuesday's blizzard, when

the tragedy occurred, Capt. Winsor said that he had his men on the ice that morning when as the day advanced he got them all on board safely. The rest of the steel fleet will be home shortly. "This forenoon, about 11 o'clock, on the way home, the Beothic passed the Bellaventure, which is anxiously looked forward to arrive, about 10 miles off Cape St. Francis, and making little or no progress. In Captain Winsor's opinion the "Bell" would be clear about 1 p.m. and should arrive here about 4.30 or 5 p.m.

Delayed.

Acting upon the countless wireless despatches received concerning the terrible calamity that doomed nearly half of the Newfoundland's crew, and that the Bellaventure was coming home with all the bodies of the dead and injured, except eight, practically all St. John's lined up the waterfront at dinner hour to-day, awaiting the arrival of the Bellaventure. She was reported at noon as having passed Pouch Cove, and would enter port about 1.15. In consequence a mass of humanity gathered near the Seamen's Institute. As much as the police force members could do was to keep back a portion of the crowd notwithstanding that the area is roped off. General regret and disappointment is felt by relatives who were anxious to see the dead and dying that were on the Bellaventure and they are doubly grieved.

Cable News.

LONDON, April 3.

Lord Roberts, to-night, was elected President of the League of British Covenanters, at a meeting held at Caxton Hall. Resolutions were adopted pledging the covenanters to do all in their power to prevent the establishment of Home Rule in Ireland without the sanction of the nation; and to support the people of Ulster in their gallant struggle to maintain their constitutional rights.

Speeches made by Walter Long, former Chief Secretary for Ireland, Lord Milner, Sir Edward Carson. Sir Edward Carson said the Government either would have to exclude Ulster from their bill or make up their minds they would have blood shed and coercion.

COURT ANGUS, Scotland.

To-day.
Premier Asquith, accompanied by Mrs. Asquith and their daughter arrived here at 8 this evening after a triumphal progress from London. Asquith received deputations of Liberals at Grantham, York, Newcastle and Edinburgh during the day. At each place he delivered brief speeches of thanks. These speeches, however, were without special reference to politics. Asquith will make the first speech of the campaign for reelection to the Commons at Ladbroke to-morrow afternoon. Unopponents threaten that if the speech is pro-

ductive in the sense of raising the army question as an electioneering device, they will rescind their decision not to oppose the Premier's reelection.
