**"Knavish Tricks"**  
**Lustily Sung by**  
**Martial Bishops.**

Offending Part of National Anthem Quite Proper For Church Singing— Demonstration is Vehemently Given.

TORONTO, September 18. — The "war verse" of the National Anthem, which has already been the bone of contention at several sessions of the General Synod, furnished the impulse for a further display of military ardor in the Lower House to-day. Not only was it debated, but it was sung with a fervent vigor which aroused the echoes in historic old Trinity, and the House of Bishops may assume all the credit for the outburst.

When the recommendation to restore the verse in good standing in the Anglican hymnal was defeated by a close vote on Thursday, many delegates looked upon the incident as closed, but the Bishops willed otherwise. They didn't overrule the Lower House in the matter, because the Lower House did not send them any message on the subject, but they evidently did a little discussing and debating of the subject themselves. The upshot of this was that Prolocutor Powell received the following message from the Bishops:

"The president of the Upper House begs to inform the prolocutor that the Upper House has unanimously adopted the following resolution:—

"That in the judgment of the Upper House, in a time of war and tumult, the second verse of the National Anthem (beginning "O Lord our God, arise,") may be sung in our churches with perfect propriety."

The reading of the communication elicited rounds of applause, and the delegates with "almost" one accord, arose and sang the much-debated verse, putting especial emphasis on the words.

"Confound their politics;  
Frustrate their knavish tricks."

The outburst had subsided, Dr. Milman, of Toronto, who all along had been a vigorous critic of the verse, vouchsafed a final protest.

"I hope the members of the Synod will be able to pronounce with a clear conscience the fifth clause of the Lord's Prayer—"Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those that trespass against us." (Cries of Oh! Oh! Sit down!)

The action of the Upper House does not mean that the verse is re-inserted in the National Anthem, but simply endorses its singing now.

**LITTLE GEOGRAPHY LESSONS — ICELAND.**

Iceland is situated in the Atlantic Ocean so far north that no ocean liner has ever run into it in a fog. It is one of the coldest and most isolated of civilized lands and one of the happiest, because no government has ever considered it worth attacking with a fleet and army.

Iceland is about 250 miles east of Greenland and 600 miles west of Norway. Hundreds of years before North America was discovered the fierce Vikings landed on Iceland occasionally and it has been settled with Europeans for many centuries. It is 300 miles long and 200 miles broad and has 75,999 inhabitants and no moving-picture theatres, bill-boards, joy-rides, trusts, aldermen or automatic pianos. Because of these facts Icelanders live very contentedly and very rarely emigrate to warmer countries.

Iceland is about as far north as Nome and in the northern part the sun doesn't set for a week at a time in midsummer. But it has the finest warm-water heating system in the world—being in the middle of a branch of the Gulf Stream. This keeps Iceland from freezing solid in the winter, but also keeps it so foggy and damp in the summer that a corn crop wouldn't ripen in three years, and an implement salesman would starve, for there are no farmers on the Island. Hay is the only crop made, but sheep, ponies, elder ducks and reindeer are raised and the Icelanders catch enough fish in the summer to keep them supplied with fish-balls all winter.

The Icelanders belong to Denmark, but speak the purest Norwegian left in circulation and govern themselves so successfully by means of an "Althing" that they have never had a scandal. This country should at once dispatch a commission to Iceland to examine the "Althing" and bring a shipload of them here, if possible. Iceland exports wool, stockings, fish, horses, elder down and moss. It has a telegraph cable to Europe and since the war a ship line to the United States. Those Americans who cannot get along happily on \$500,000 a year should make a short excursion to Iceland and examine its inhabitants with great care.
