War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M. BREXIT ON CHARGES OF COMPLICITY. LONDON, May 4. James Sullivan, of New York, formerly American Minister to Santo Domingo, has been arrested in Dublin on charges of complicity in the Irish rebellion. Sullivan sailed from New York last July for Liverpool with his wife and son, saying he was going to Limerick to visit his father. He said that he expected to return to New York by September. Sullivan was finally asked to resign as Minister to Santo Domingo Republic. It is understood that the report censured Sullivan for indiscretions in the conduct of his office.

STATEMENT ON THE REBELLION NEXT WEEK. LONDON, May 4. The Commons to-day Premier Lloyd George made a statement as to the causes of the Irish revolt, next week. The Premier said it was not desirable to say anything more at the moment, that the appropriate steps were being taken to deal with the Irish rebellion and those responsible for it. Asked whether the rebels would be tried by martial law or by civil tribunal, the Premier said that he had never said anything regarding the enquiry being judicial one.

MITCHELL EULOGIZES TOWNSHEND. LONDON, May 4. In the Lords to-day, Lord Kitchener eulogized General Townshend and the defenders of Kut-el-Amarah, which is as follows: "We are proud to know that we have done our duty, and recognize that our situation is one of the fortunes of war. I thank you, General Gorringe, and all ranks of the Tigris force, for the great efforts you have made to save us." Imminent starvation impelled the surrender of Kut-el-Amarah, said Lord Kitchener. Adverse elements alone denied success the relief force.

LOYD GEORGE IN THE COMMONS. LONDON, May 4. Speaking on a motion to reject the Military Service Bill, Lloyd George said in the Commons to-day that he did not rather be driven out of the Liberal party, even out of political life, together, than have upon his conscience the responsibility for retarding the progress of the military authorities, which might make all the difference between defeat and victory. He also asserted that if the war had not lasted until 1917, the nation could not have followed the course, were both inaccurate and injudicious. He had consulted leading financiers in the country, and they had not the least hesitation in affirming that, however long the war lasted, it could outlast anything that Germany could do, but in any case it would be better to apply the full power of the law, he argued. Until Russia had completed her equipment so as to employ her immense reserves of men, it was essential that France and Britain should every available man in the field, he said, was well aware of the danger of this country falling to the hands of the enemy, it is possible that this year's burdens immediately.

AMERICANS TO FORM BATTALION IN CANADA. Ottawa, April 27.—Recruiting for the new battalion of the American Legion has begun at Toronto. Robert J. Bates, former brigadier general of the Michigan National Guard, will command the new unit. He has planned to open headquarters at Exhibition Camp, Toronto. The new unit will be known as the 213th battalion and will be recruited in the territory east from Ft. William to the Atlantic. Officers have been instructed to facilitate the formation of the battalion by allowing American citizens offering themselves for service to join the 213th battalion.

Bates will rank as Lieut.-Col. in the Canadian Army. He has had more than twenty-five years service with United States fighting forces and commanded the 2nd battalion of the 34th Michigan Regiment at Santiago in the Spanish-American war. "We American citizens are only paying back a little of what we owe Canada," said Bates to-day. "Fifty thousand Canadians fought for the North in the Civil War."

Volplaning Across the Channel. Mr. Tennant's remarkable story, told in the House of Commons the other night, about the British flying officer who covered eight miles without any engine when he was attacking a Fokker shed, may puzzle the uninitiated. The officer, Mr. Tennant said, was at a great height when he switched down his engine, and he used that height to lengthen his descent. Eight miles is a pretty good distance for a heavier-than-air machine to cover in such circumstances, especially when loaded with bombs, but nowadays this distance is frequently exceeded, and it is a not uncommon occurrence for squadrons of British aeroplanes crossing to France to plane nearly the whole distance across the Channel. They make a point of reaching such an altitude before they leave the English coast that they may be sure of gaining a French landing, in the event of their engines failing, by planning alone.—Manchester Guardian.

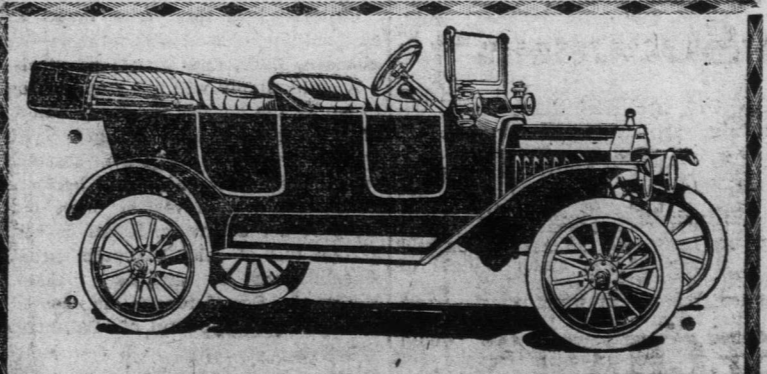
