To-day's Messages.**LABOR AND MAYOR'S RELEASE.**

NEW YORK, Sept. 3. A resolution, asking Secretary of the City to demand the release of James MacSweeney, was adopted tonight by the Central Federation of Labor Unions. An announcement was made that Union Warehouse workers will refuse to handle British goods until the Lord Mayor of London is given his liberty.

LSHEVSKIS WANT ARMISTICE.

LONDON, Sept. 4. The Bolsheviks desire an immediate armistice with the Poles, according to information that has reached the news from well informed sources in Warsaw. "It is unlikely," says the news informant, "that there will be any difficulty over the frontier question, and it is probable that a preliminary agreement will be reached between Poles and Russians a few

days after the first meeting. The Poles are willing to confer either at Koval or Riga, and Poland is described as being conciliatory."

NO RADICAL CHANGE.

LONDON, Sept. 3.

The condition of Lord Mayor MacSweeney showed no radical change to-night, although he was said gradually to be growing weaker. Soon MacSweeney, his brother, remained at the prison to-night. The Gaelic League announced to-night that for the first time during his hunger strike, the Lord Mayor had complained to his wife of feeling very tired. The prisoner was unable to converse with his relatives. He was still quite conscious, however, and his mind was as clear and his will as strong as ever. Labor leaders addressed an appeal to Premier Lloyd George asking the Lord Mayor's release. Among the signatures being William Adamson, Labor member of Parliament, Robert Smillie, President of Miners' Federation, Robert Williams of Transport Workers' Union, and George Lansbury, editor of the Daily Herald, the organ of Labor.

Re-opens Monday.

The school on the Southside re-opens on Monday next at 9 a.m. During the holidays the building has been thoroughly renovated, cleaned and painted, and made more suitable in every possible way to meet the needs of the children. Lavatories and wash-basins have been installed, a partition has been run through the main school room, separating the two classrooms, the heating apparatus has been rearranged, and additional furnishings necessary to the work of the school have been supplied. The Board has been fortunate in securing Mr. H. T. Bishop, a first grade teacher of long experience, as principal of the school. Miss Reeves, a teacher of considerable experience, has also been engaged as assistant to Mr. Bishop. It is hoped that the children of the Southside who last year attended Springdale Street, will now enter their own school and thus relieve the congestion in Springdale Street.

The Licensed Exporters and Mr. Cooker met again at 3 p.m. yesterday in the Grenfell Hall. W. A. Munn spoke on the requirements of Italy and raised objection to the shipping of fish to that market through a combine and to Mr. Hawes, who is a member of Messrs. Barr and Job favored the views of Mr. Hawes as one of the channels of shipping, but others opposed it. It was decided, after a general discussion that matters be left in the hands of the Advisory Board, who will meet to-day, and that their findings be sent to every exporter after this and subsequent meetings.
