

In Memoriam.

JAMES KENNEDY, HOLYROOD.
It is with very sincere regret we announce the demise of James Kennedy of Holyrood, who died December 19, 1920, in the 55th year of his age. He was a hale and hearty man until about a year ago when he was stricken with a serious illness that debilitated the best medical skill and the efforts of several physicians either to prevent the fatal germs of disease or to prolong the man's life. He was sent to the General Hospital for special treatment but was returned home in August last, after a month's treatment. In the hospital and at his home almost to the end, he was strong within his breast that he would stand aside for some time longer. But also a change for the better set in. Rev. Fr. Finn was called to administer the last sacraments of Holy Church to the dying man. Not many hours after, in the midst of his immediate relatives, the soul of James Kennedy passed to its eternal reward. The funeral took place on the 20th inst., from his home to the new cemetery, and when the funeral service had been read over the deceased, the procession returned and proceeded to the new cemetery where the remains were laid to rest, all alone, in a new plot. The late Mr. Kennedy was a hard working, industrious and thrifty fisherman who for fifteen years was a member of the crew of the "Promised Land" of the New York and Newfoundland Fisheries Co., from whose service he returned home sick in December, 1919. Mr. Kennedy, truly, inhered the share of the wit and humor in the family. In company he was entertaining as a story-teller and a fund of fun and humor appeared in his hearers. Doubtless many a one who gazed on the face of their dear friend for the last time at the funeral, saw those lips sealed and never still said a silent prayer for a child who could so well shed many a tear and run around the hearth. He leaves to mourn him: his widow, Mrs. James Kennedy; two daughters—Genevieve, schoolteacher at Newtown, and Rose, school-teacher at North Arm; two brothers, Roger J., Inspector Government Railways; Capt. Walter Kennedy, Newfoundland Trade Commissioner; Miss Michael, mate, S.S. "W. B. Harris"; Promised Land Fisheries Co.; Thomas, State Contractor, New York; and sister, Mrs. Peter Hickey, Holyrood; to each and all whom we offer our sincere sympathy, and may the Lord have mercy on his soul.—COM.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

SPY ARRESTED.
VIENNA, Feb. 20.
Ignatius Tribich Lincoln, notorious as an international spy, has been arrested here. The arrest was made yesterday on an extradition warrant of a Foreign Government presumably Great Britain. It is understood that the Austrian Government also will bring charges against Lincoln, alleging forgery of documents in connection with his recent activities, and also accusing him of residing in Vienna under false names.

TO THE UTMOST FARTHING.

LONDON, Feb. 20.
Aristide Briand, French Premier, and General Berthelot, arrived in London to-night for an Allied conference, with the announced resolute purpose of not reducing, by as much as a centime, the total reparations that Germany must pay as a result of war, as agreed to at the recent Paris conference. But the Prime Minister is disposed to examine attentively, from his own sympathetic conditions of payment, should German delegates come to London with proposals reasonably within the scope of Allied decisions.

DUNNING BY WARSHIP NOT TRUE.

SAN SALVADOR, Feb. 20.
Denial was given to-day, of a report that the British cruiser Cambrian had been sent to Salvador, because of the failure of Salvador to pay interest on a loan made to the Government by the Royal Bank of Canada. It is said that the Salvador Government has had no dealings with this bank.

STORM CLUTCHED NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.
The belief held by many that the winter climate of California had moved to Eastern United States, was rudely dispelled early to-day, when the first important snow storm of the season descended upon New England, New York, and Eastern States. To-night seven thousand men were at work in this city alone, endeavoring to keep the main arteries of traffic clear. Surface and elevated transportation was badly disrupted from early morning, many lines having discontinued struggling entirely. Trains arriving in New York were reported fairly well on time. The centre of the main blizzard was New York City and vicinity, other districts reporting much lighter snow falls. The storm passed off at New York at ten o'clock, leaving a snow fall of thirteen inches. About an hour later, the steamship Cold Harbor, which ran aground at Connetquot Island, was refloated, with the aid of tugs and a rising tide.

HUN WAR CHIEFS DEAD.

BERLIN, Feb. 20.
The death is announced of two German war chiefs, General Hans Von Boethin and General Von Pleck. Von Boethin, during the recent war, was known as the German "Retreat Specialist."

HEAVY CASUALTIES.

CORK, Feb. 20.
Fifteen civilians were killed, and eight captured, of whom three were wounded, in an engagement this afternoon in the district of Lisgow and Midland, Cork County, according to a general headquarters report. This is believed to have been the largest number of casualties among members of the Irish Republican Army in any single encounter.

FRANCE UNANIMOUS.

PARIS, Feb. 20.
Former Premier Poincaré in a signed article in the Temps, to-day, declared that Germany must meet the demands made upon her by the Reparations Commission. If Germany refuses to accept the demands made at the Paris Conference, says M. Poincaré, then the Versailles Treaty automatically comes into force. It is impossible that a third bill of costs can be drawn up at London. The French Government can count upon the firm determination of both Chambers of Parliament to reject any further delays that Germany may

claim, concerning penalties, and also will obtain from our Allies a full endorsement of France's demands.

BRUTAL MURDER.

DUBLIN, Feb. 20.
Former Sergeant Nohilly was shot and wounded in Cork on Saturday and was taken to hospital. Four armed men, this morning, entered the hospital and carried Nohilly, who was unconscious, on a stretcher into the street and shot him dead. A laborer was shot dead near Cashel; another laborer was shot and seriously wounded at Mullagh Meath last night. Twenty armed men, yesterday, held up a train at Clara, King's County, and took away the kits of officers on board.

INCENDIARY AND SUICIDE.

ST. STEPHEN, N.B., Feb. 20.
After three unsuccessful attempts to kill his father, Ostris Nixon, aged sixty, of Waweg, Charlotte County, Ostris Nixon to-day set fire to and destroyed his father's property, valued at eight thousand dollars and shot and killed himself within one hundred yards of buildings he had destroyed. So far as can be learned the act was deliberately planned.

DEADLY WATER.

MONTREAL, Feb. 20.
Two boys were drowned, damage estimated at over a hundred thousand dollars done, thirty families were rendered homeless, and twenty-eight persons were taken to the Montreal General Hospital, as the result of a burst high pressure water main, feeding the east end of the city, which occurred at the corner of Sturbin and Dorchester Streets to-day. Of those taken to the General Hospital, only two were seriously enough injured to be admitted to the wards.

ALDERMEN INTERRED.

CORK, Feb. 20.
Nine members of the Cork Corporation, and other leading men of South Ireland, were among the eighty persons sent to the Spike Island internment camp, Saturday, as political prisoners.

KILLED TWO BROTHERS.

DUBLIN, Feb. 21.
Called upon to halt at Blackwater, County Clare, a number of youths refused to do so, when soldiers fired a volley, killing two Donovan brothers, fourteen and eighteen years of age.

MURDERED IN COLD BLOOD.

GALWAY, Feb. 21.
District Councillor, John Geoghegan, was taken from his bed, Sunday morning, to the roadside and shot by two masked men, who told him he had been convicted of treason.

GOVERNMENT GIVES WAY.

VIENNA, Feb. 21.
The Government has again yielded to the demands of civil employees, and promises an immediate bonus of two thousand, four hundred crowns for the current month and revision of salaries.

IN FATHER'S FOOTSTEPS.

NEW HAVEN, Feb. 21.
John Rowland Angell, son of the late President Angell, of the University of Michigan, has been elected President of Yale University, in succession to President Arthur Thadley.

STEAMER WRECKED.

PORT ARTHUR, Feb. 21.
One person was drowned, and several rescued with difficulty, when the steamer Lucero Del Alba, with seventeen passengers and a crew of eight, was wrecked Saturday at the entrance to the Bay of Vera Cruz.

FLEEING FROM BOLSHIEVICS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 21.
The situation at Trifis, capital of the Republic of Georgia, is reported as being more quiet to-day. Thousands of persons are said to have been fleeing for four days before advancing Bolshieviki in Georgia.

Western Notes.

The curtailment of supplies by the firm of R. Moulton, Ltd., at Burnt Islands, Burgeo and LaPole, consequent upon business depression, has had a disastrous effect on that once thriving settlement, and much suffering has been induced by lack of provisions, and the scant purchases of fish made by itinerant buyers.

There is good fishing to be done, if sales could be effected, but the Atlantic Fish Company are only buying from a limited number of doras. Others have to do the best they can in the way of disposing of their daily catches, even in many instances having to go to Rose Blanche, a distance of eight miles by water, to effect a sale.

The prices paid by the Atlantic Company are 14 cents per pound for round, and 2 cents per pound for split, and the sellers are not paid on the spot, but have to journey to Rose Blanche for their money, the time taken being dependent upon the weather. In some instances a week has been lost in getting to and fro.

A mass meeting was held at Burnt Islands, some time ago, at which some strong language was used against the Government for its action in placing the embargo on West Coast fish last summer, but that does not help matters now, only intensifies the feeling against Squires and Coaker. The present price being paid for fresh fish is not enough to compensate those who catch it, and the prohibitive prices asked for provisions, coal and outfits cannot be met. Destitution is bound to prevail, but there are hopes that a market for the sale of all fish caught will soon be made—but only if Americans send schooners from Gloucester and other New England ports to buy salt bulk or fresh.

Defends U. S. Marines.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir—I have read the letter of Mr. J. R. Smallwood in regard to the "atrocities" of the American marines in Haiti. Has Mr. Smallwood not seen the recent report of the court of inquiry which probed the matter, declaring that the charges were unsubstantiated? The President of Haiti, himself, testified at this inquiry that he knew of no murders by the marines. Instead of the thousands of cases Mr. Smallwood mentions only nine or ten could be brought before the court by the natives of Haiti. I know the American marines pretty well, and no finer or more humane body of men exist anywhere. Of course there are some "black and tan" among them, as there are in every military organization, but on the whole they bear an unsurmised record in war and in peace.

The campaign in Haiti was waged against the most horrible savages that this hemisphere knows. Cases of soldiers being murdered and mutilated by these devil worshippers have been numerous, and it was testified at the inquiry that, in one case a soldier's heart was removed and eaten by the ghastly cannibals. Until the American forces went to Haiti that awful country was in the throes of a voodooism, devil worship and wholesale murder. The Americans cleaned up the plague spots and gave the country a new lease of life. The negro, no matter how well educated he may be, is still something of a primal savage, and the very best of them have never been able to accomplish anything worth while in the realm of literature, statesmanship or science. Those men of color who have won distinction have had white blood in their veins.

In Haiti the same problem exists as it does wherever the negro wants to rule the white. His limited intelligence unfits him for the task. Liberia is another example of negro culture. After fifty years of self-rule, instead of advancing, the blacks have gone back to savagery, until out of 200,000 people, only 50,000 cases be called civilized. In regard to Hawaii and the Philippines, I would like to know when America ever fought a
