DYING BY THOUSANDS.

RIGA, Dec. 22.

"The famine situation in Russia has become absolutely ghastly," said Colonel Haskell, Director of American Relief Work in Russia, on his arrival here from Moscow. "Where a few months ago people were dying by hundreds, they are now dying by thousands."

STARVING CHILDREN.

MOSCOW, Dec. 23.

The death rate in the famine districts of Russia is rising rapidly. More than two hundred victims are buried every day in the Saratov resion. The United States relief administration is now feeding more than eight hundred thousand children and the number is expected to pass the million mark by Christmas.

HOW JAPAN VIEWS IT.

PARIS, Dec. 23.

Premier Takahashi, of Japan, is sucted by the Tokio correspondent of the newspaper "Excelsior," as declaring "The quadruple entente, which for Japan replaces the Anglo-ispanese alliance is much wider in its bearing on all chances of war.
