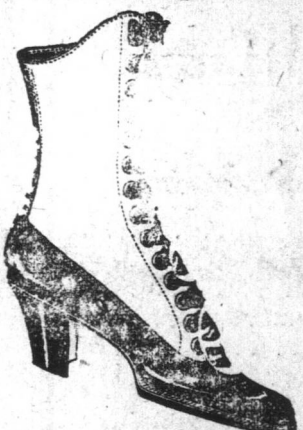

The Great Find in Egypt.

ITS TRUE SIGNIFICANCE — A UNIQUE TREASURE

The following account of the recent discovery in the Valley of the Kings has been especially written for the "Morning Post" by the Earl of Carnarvon and Mr. Howard Carter.

Primarily the most important point is that the tomb of King Tutankhamen appears to be the first royal tomb we have found more or less intact. For this reason we are now able to tell more or less what the funerary equipment of a royal burial comprises. Unfortunately objects of greater intrinsic value appear to be missing, and were probably taken by metal robbers of the Twentieth Dynasty. Notwithstanding this it appears that all the smaller jewellery is there and paraphernalia comprising furniture, emblems, and details for the King's protection in the underworld, as well as portraits, statues, chariots, chests of robes, falcon vessels, chairs, bedsteads, etc.

One of the most important factors in this discovery is the fact that these objects show both the style of Akhenat as well as that of Thebes, and hence for purity of Egyptian work some of them have never been surpassed. The seal impressions upon the closed doorways show at least three types; those of the royal necropolis, Tutankhamen's, and what appear to be household seals (as their impressions are not altogether perfect it will be a little time before we can decipher their real meaning, as we must compare different impressions on various doorways.)

It is interesting to note that there are fragments of boxes which were found outside the entrance of the tomb bearing the double protocol of Akhenaten and King Sekhem-kara and his wife, who was the daughter of Khuenaten, called Meretaten. Now, as these are purely sepulchral monuments and bear both protocols, it would seem that the two Kings either died or abdicated simultaneously, and that they are found in this King's tomb indicates that Tutankhamen succeeded them immediately. As we have not yet gone carefully into these matters, however, the hypothesis may require modification, and we are trusting that on the arrival of Dr. Alan Gardiner we shall get more important historical data, the more so when we are able to unroll and decipher the papyrus in one of the chests. From external appearances these documents appear to be historical rather than religious, for they are rolled with the ends overturned and sealed. Again, numbers of the caskets bear long texts, which may also help us in solving the puzzle.

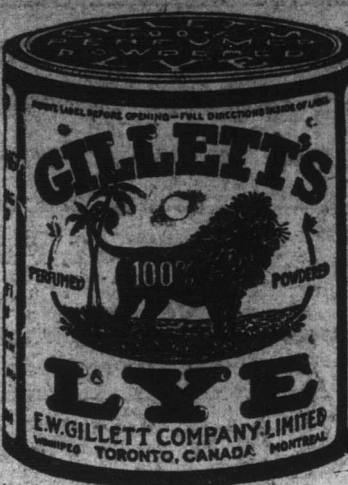

placed together, which necessarily will be the work of many days, involving considerable careful examination. The beauties of many of these things are beyond description, and there also seem to be objects at present unknown to archaeology.

There is a note of pathetic interest in the fact that leaning up against one wall beside the statues there is a large bouquet standing about three or four feet high, which naturally the robbers had not touched. When we first entered these chambers from the disorderly array of objects we gathered the impression that we had discovered a cache of King's furniture brought from Tel el Amarna, but now we feel that it is evident that we have discovered a King's tomb and that the sealed doorways, still intact, will prove to be the opening into the sepulchral chamber or chambers.

A WONDERFUL SIGHT.

As it was the custom in the Eighteenth Dynasty not to decorate the antechambers of the King's sepulchral hall, it is probable that the inside chamber or chambers will be decorated. It will also be interesting to see how far the project of the tomb of Rameses IV. given in Turin papyrus will be confirmed by the sepulchral hall. Also it will be a unique sight to find the mummy of a King in the sepulchral chambers.

One peculiarity in this sepulchre is that, as compared with the rest of the royal tombs, it is quite small and does not show any resemblance to the Theban plan. A Theban royal tomb of the Eighteenth Dynasty comprises three sections, the entrance to a descending passage and staircases which lead to a protective wall on the further side of which is the vestibule, sunken staircase, passage, and ante-chamber, which lead in turn to the sepulchral hall, crypt, and store-chambers. In this tomb the first passage leads directly to the chambers adjoining one another, and thus appears more the El Amarna type than that of Thebes. From this it is difficult to know exactly what yet is to be found, but there is little doubt that this discovery will throw considerable light on a somewhat obscure period about 1350 B.C.—Morning Post, Dec. 12.

Christmas Shopping In Russia?

When the master of the Hampstead Heath touched at Novorossisk in April last he purchased a few turkeys, butter and eggs to help round out the ship's larder. With turkeys at three for 7,500,000 roubles and incidentals like 5,000,000 roubles for the interpreter, the bill came to \$4,440,000 roubles. However, as this is only \$32 in Canadian money it indicates that Soviet finance does not prevent Canadians who happen to go to Russia from living on the best in the land. The Soviet seems to have earned the thanks of the sailors of the Hampstead Heath in changing their fare from salt pork and hard tack to turkeys and eggs. Swedish Scientists

PREDICT LONG LIFE FOR SUN.

STOCKHOLM. — "The sun can keep on shining at the present rate for another 86,000,000,000 years, and if human culture is to perish it will not be for lack of sunshine." This startling and whimsical statement was made in the course of a recent lecture by Dr. Svante Arrhenius, the Swedish authority on astrophysics, in which he explained certain theories and discoveries regarding solar conditions. "Suppose the sun were a mass of coal," said Dr. Arrhenius in order to illustrate his problem. "Giving forth heat energy at the present rate, it would then have lasted only 4,000 years, or about half as long as the period of known human history. But since there were living things of some kind on earth at least 1,000,000,000 years ago, and since there has evidently been very little deterioration of the sun during that period of time, any theory of the expenditure of solar energy must provide for upwards of one hundred billion years."

CAUSE OF LIGHT AND HEAT.

Though it is difficult to interpret Dr. Arrhenius in popular language, it may be of interest to state his general theory. Heavenly bodies begin as cold nebulous masses of hydrogen, helium and the so-called nebulae. Light then arises through radioactivity. The hydrogen is condensed to form the other two elements, helium and nebulae, and from these develop a whole series of heavier elements, the most abundant of which is iron. After this stage has been passed, the radioactive elements again resolve themselves into unstable elements and produce helium. This chemical process, going on in cycles, accounts for the lavish production of light and heat by the sun. What becomes of dead stars? Dr. Arrhenius replied to this question that celestial bodies which have burned out may flame up again in case they happen to wander into nebulous regions where condensation and production of heat again takes place. Thus he explained the discoveries of new stars which are frequently announced by astronomers. Dr. Arrhenius paid a tribute to the successful work of American astronomers, remarking wistfully that, in addition to bright stars, they are also favored by ample funds for research and experiment.
