### NO SUCCESSOR YET.

LONDON, May 21. No move has been made to-night to fill the vacancy of Premiership and the name of Bonar Law's successor is still a matter of speculation. Marquis Curzon and Stanley Baldwin are still the most talked of but it may possibly turn out that their claims so well balance a solution may ultimately be found in a compromise candidate.

### THE SWISS REPLY.

GENEVA, May 21. The Swiss reply to the Russian note protesting against its contribution to the assassination of Soviet representative Vorovsky states that Switzerland has a better right to demand an explanation for the violence suffered by the thousands of Swiss in Russia under the Soviet regime than to give explanations regarding the death of one Russian who was an unofficial and unwelcome guest. Replying to the protest

that Vorovsky was not properly protected, the note says Switzerland cannot give special police supervision to every visitor to the country and concludes with the statement that Maurice Conrad will be tried in strict accordance with Swiss law and no foreign interference will be tolerated.

### LAW UNDERGOES SLIGHT OPERATION.

LONDON, May 21. The physicians of Andrew Bonar Law today issued the following statement: "Mr. Bonar Law had a slight operation on the throat to-day. Otherwise his condition is unchanged."

### McMASTER TO ATTACK BUDGET.

OTTAWA, May 21. Andrew McMaster, representing Bromes, Quebec, intends to deliver his speech on the budget from across the floor of the House. He returned to-day from consulting some of his leading supporters and authorized his statement. If it appears that his electors do not approve his course Mr. McMaster has intimated his willingness to resign at the close of this session. Mr. McMaster was elected as a Liberal.

### THREE DAYS IN OPEN DORY.

NORTH SYDNEY, May 21. Captain Wootton and seven men of the Nassau schooner, Marcella, had a thrilling experience, being three days and nights in an open dory in the ice floes off the Cape Breton coast before they landed in an exhausted condition at Port Morien. The Marcella, on a voyage from Nassau to St. Pierre with twelve hundred cases of liquor, became badly jammed and pierced by ice floes and sank shortly after being abandoned, according to members of the crew.

### THE MARVALE'S PASSENGERS.

MONTREAL, May 21. The Marvale sailed from Montreal for Liverpool on May 18. She carried one hundred and thirty cabin and eighty third class passengers from here.

### SIX KILLED IN RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

LISBON, Portugal, May 21. Six passengers were killed, and thirty injured, most of them seriously, in an accident to a descending train on the Cogwheel railway on Mount Bon Jesus, near Braga to-day.

**Herring Fleet Get Clear.**  
SCHOONERS WERE FROZEN IN ALL WINTER.

The Asst.-Collector of Customs at Wood's Island wired yesterday, to the effect that the schooners, comprising the herring fishery fleet, which had been frozen in there all winter, had been freed, and were now proceeding to their destinations. The schooner Aviator has sailed for Gloucester with a cargo of herring. The Helen Nair has left for Halifax with a cargo of empty oil drums, while the Sheppard King and Jean Smith are on their way to Lunenburg to ballast. The schooner W. G. Smith is now loading a cargo of Scotch cured herring, and is expected to leave within a few days for New York. The vessels were recently freed by the Canadian Govt. steamer Montcalm. The herring fishery is said to be a blank as a result of the fleet being frozen in.

### Currents and Climate.

Weather predictions for the sea are still to come, but knowledge of the physical conditions in our waters is rapidly augmenting. On and off our coast a never-ending battle is in progress between the Labrador current with its icy freight from the Arctic regions, and the Gulf Stream with its stored heat from the tropics. The chief battleground lies on and near the grand Bank of Newfoundland, not far from where the Titanic found a watery grave, and where at the present moment the struggle is most intense, with the cold current in the ascendancy. The contest between the rival forces is not confined to the open ocean; but is waged close to the coast and in the larger bays. It continues throughout the year, for at certain depths, ice-cold Arctic conditions are to be found in late summer, almost to the southernmost tip of Nova Scotia. The variable conditions so produced are responsible for the immensity of our fishery resources, as well as for the great fluctuations from year to year in the amount of fish caught. So knowledge of the causes underlying these weather and water changes which will make their prediction possible beforehand will be of great value. The Dominion Biological experts are studying the question and laying the basis for a rational series of production. They have already discovered what conditions are good for fish and lobster culture and what are not, so they know when it pays best to spread the young fry from the fish-hatcheries.

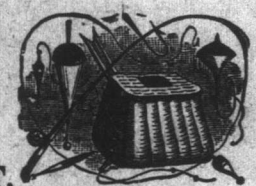
