Lord Curzon Considers Occupation of Ruhr Illegal.

Argentine Swimmer Crosses Channel in Record Time--Fire in Montreal Causes Immense Damage--Germany in the Grip of Anarchy.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT DECIDES RUHR OCCUPATION ILLEGAL.

LONDON, Aug. 13. The British Government in publishing to-day of official correspondence with the Allies since the placement of its position with regard to the German Reparations problem. Lord Curzon, Secretary for Foreign Affairs in an elaborate note sets out the British Government's view on the occupation of the Ruhr. It is unauthorized by the Versailles Treaty, thus supporting the contention in this respect. It is, however, to submit the matter to arbitration at the Hague or to some other body, while still adhering to a tone of utmost courtesy and forbearing definiton with regard to separate action on the part of Britain. Lord Curzon emphasizes that Great Britain cannot agree to the French policy which he finds plainly, seems to point to the occupation of the Ruhr. Lord Curzon still leaves it to the French Government to suggest a method of settling an International Committee to settle into Germany's capacity for reparations, but he plainly declares that Great Britain cannot accept the decision of the Reparations Committee on this matter since that decision has become a mere instrument of the Franco-Belgian policy. Finally Lord Curzon declares that the British Government still adheres to the plan of former Premier Bonar Law, under which Great Britain is satisfied to obtain from Germany a sum sufficient to meet its obligations to the United States. Lord Curzon in summarizing the British view says "His Majesty's Government never contemplated that Germany should be relieved of all reparations payments; they are determined Germany shall pay to the maximum of her capacity. What the maximum should be may be decided by Imperial enquiry. To ask more of Germany's capacity can only deplete the assets which Germany will be able to offer the Allies."

STRIKERS AND FARMERS IN PITCHED BATTLE.

BERLIN, Aug. 13. Eleven persons were killed and many wounded on Saturday in a clash between striking workmen and peasants, at Aix La Chapelle, according to a report reaching Berlin. After Friday's raid on nearby farms by city workers, peasants organized self-

NO IMMEDIATE RELEASE OF POLITICAL PRISONERS.

BERLIN, Aug. 12. It was officially announced on Saturday there would be no immediate release of political prisoners. Kevin O'Higgins, Minister of Home Affairs, said the Government had evidence that the Republicans are preparing to renew onslaught on the economic life of the country. In those circumstances it was not proposed to release immediately and indiscriminately those who had challenged the people.

ARGENTINE SWIMMER CROSSES THE CHANNEL IN 16 HOURS.

DOVER, England, Aug. 13. Enrique Tirabocchi, the Argentine swimmer, landed here this afternoon after swimming the English Channel from Cape Gris Nez, France, in the record time of sixteen hours, and thirty-three minutes.

The Coming Economic Conference.

It is felt by Canadians who are in close touch with British affairs that we are not taking advantage of our opportunities in respect of bettering our trade relations with the British Isles. With the general European markets in economic chaos through lack of money or credits, and with the Fordney tariff making trade with the United States next to impossible in respect to food stuffs, we must of necessity find an outlet for our surplus products in the British Isles. According to private advices from Canadian business men now resident in London, we are "asleep at the switch," while such countries as South Africa and the Australian Commonwealth are very much alive.

ROOMS COOLIDGE.

SPokane, Aug. 11. Senator William E. Borah, of Idaho speaking here said he believed President Coolidge to be the logical man for Republican presidential nomination in the next campaign, and called upon the public to "give him a chance to make good."

4 KILLED, 50 WOUNDED IN RED DEMONSTRATION.

CREFIELD, France, Aug. 13. During plundering of food shops and other demonstrations against food shortage and currency stringency, four demonstrators were killed and thirty wounded, several of whom are expected to die, during a clash with newly organized police. Several textile plants were seized by demonstrators, some of whom carried red flags. Virtually all the manufacturing district of Crefield is at a standstill owing to demonstrations.

SERIOUS SITUATION IN GERMAN INDUSTRIES.

BERLIN, Aug. 11. There has been continuous rioting at the big industrial plants in and around Berlin the past few days, caused by the food situation, money shortage and wage disputes. At the Glatz Siemens Works in Siemensstadt the workers assumed an attitude of passive resistance, refusing to do any work, upon which the management shut down the plants which normally employ one hundred thousand men. At other shops and plants the Soviets hoisted red flags.

MAY SHINE AGAIN.

LONDON—(A.P.)—England needs a new law regulating public houses and places of entertainment, say the owners of London hotels and dance halls, who have banded together to obtain less stringent laws in the matter of closing their places.

The present law, which is adhered to vigorously by the authorities, was passed in the reign of George II, in 1751, and requires that the dance places of all classes close at the stroke of midnight. Under this act the authorities may grant special licenses for specific places to remain open until later, but generally they stick to the Georgian habits and night life in London comes to a halt at twelve o'clock.

At the present time many of the cafes in London have permits to remain open a few nights a week, but there is nothing certain in the present arrangements and they are changed as often as a new council is elected or the present members feel inclined.

The hotel and cafe-properties will ask the London County Council to draw up a new law to be presented to parliament, and they have obtained the backing of the "Brighter London" movement committee which is seeking to make London a rival of Paris.

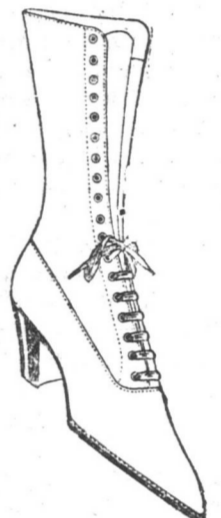
