Highly Important from Italy. Particulars of the Battle of Monte Rotundo.

Garibaldi attacks Rome. INTENSE EXCITEMENT IN ROME!

The Pope Retires to St. Angelo. FRANCE AND SPAIN TO THE POPE'S RESCUE.

VICTOR EMMANUEL DENOUNCES GARIBALDI. ACTIVITY AMONG THE FRENCH EXPEDITIONARY TROOPS.

FENIAN TRIALS IN BRITAIN. THE ITALIAN CABINET FORMED.

LONDON & LIVERPOOL MARKETS. (To-day's Despatches.)

Florence, Oct. 28th.—At the latest accounts from the south, Garibaldi, with his army, estimated at from 10,000 to 12,000 strong, had attacked the outer fortifications of Rome.

London, Oct. 28.—Advices from Rome state that great alarm prevails within the city, and an attack was hourly expected from the Garibaldians. The Pope had retired from the Vatican and sought refuge and protection in the Castle of St. Angelo.

Florence, Oct. 28th.—Gen. Menabrea, to whom was last committed the task of reorganizing the ministry, has succeeded in forming a new Cabinet. A royal proclamation has been issued, signed by King Victor Emmanuel, denouncing Garibaldi and declaring the policy of France in maintaining the approval of the September Convention.

Paris, Oct. 28th.—Large crowds left the city to attend the races at Vincennes yesterday. The Emperor Francis Joseph drove out to Vincennes in the morning, and was present in the Imperial stand. The grand prize was won by Polygone. Paris prize taken by Field.

Paris, Oct. 28.—The Pope has issued an Encyclical to the Bishops of the Church throughout Europe, in which he calls attention to the great perils by which he is now surrounded in pathetic terms, and deplores the many dangers which menace the temporal power and threaten to destroy the independence of the Holy See.

Madrid, Oct. 28.—Gen. Lesaunder has accepted the appointment of Governor and Captain General of Cuba.

Brest, Oct. 28th.—Steamer Pelicore from New York, 19th, arrived.

Florence, Oct. 28.—The following is the substance of the royal proclamation issued yesterday.—The King commends by saying the country is in great danger. He declares that a war against France and her probable allies would be impossible. He denounces the Garibaldians for usurping the right to make war, which is the prerogative of the King.

Florence, Oct. 28.—Revolutionary bands continue to cross the Italian frontier into the Papal territory. Letters from Rome dated Friday last say the Garibaldian bands which had mustered in some force near the Eternal City had fallen back, but that a very large body of the revolutionists was in position fifteen miles distant. There is no traffic to or from Rome.

Rome, Oct. 28th, evening.—Yesterday a force of armed Garibaldians attacked the town of Ballinara, about twenty-five miles south-west of Orvieto. The place was defended by the pontifical soldiers and the Garibaldians were repulsed. Garibaldi is still in position before Monte Rotundo at the head of 4,000 to 5,000 men. One thousand soldiers of the Pope's regular army marched from Rome to-day to reinforce the detachment serving in Monte Rotundo.

Toulon, Oct. 29, p.m.—Orders have been issued for every man serving in the expeditionary army designed for duty in Rome or Italy to embark at once on board the French transports lying in the harbor. Ten thousand troops of the Algerian division have arrived from Africa. The imperial northern fleet is expected at this port. Great activity prevails in all government depots, and Toulon is universally excited. The first fleet including the iron clads is still lying off the harbor awaiting the second squadron or fleet which will move out to-night.

Madrid, Oct. 26.—Rita said the Queen and cabinet of Spain have decided to join in any attack which the other Catholic powers may see fit to adopt in favor of the temporal sovereignty of the Pope and the defence of the Holy See.

London, Oct. 28.—Allan and the other prisoners arrested at Manchester, and the Special Commission, which has been in session there have adjourned. Farjola and the other Fenians who were also under examination at Dublin, have also been indicted. The indictment bears places for high treason.

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
