TYPHOID FEVER: HOW IT IS CONTRACTED AND HOW TO AVOID THE MEASLEY MICROBE

NE of the leading medical authorities of Canada, speaking at Montreal on the deadly typhoid fever, gives the following interesting advice and sugges-

1. Typhoid fever is contracted solely by the mouth. If you do not put the poison of typhoid fever into your mouth, you will never contract typhoid fever.

2. The poison of typhoid fever is derived solely from human beings, and is not present in stagnant water, damp cellars, manure, garbage, etc., unless the excretions of human beings are deposited therein or thereon. Since therefore, It is desirable that

this typhoid poison should not be put into our mouths, the following suggestions are made:

BURNHAM, M. P. FOR PETERBOROUGH, SAYS FEDERAL MARRIAGE LAW MUST BE PASSED

Vancouver, Aug. 24—"Is any further action likely to be taken in the House of Commons on the Ne Temere question in view of the recent decision of the Privy Council?" J. F. Burnham, M.P. for West Peterborough, was asked in Vancouver yesterday.

"Sometking will have to be done to provide a federal marriage law and it will not be necessary in doing so to fly in the face of the recent judgment or to offend any province," said Mr. Burnham. "A federal law can be passed and people can be married under it without conflicting with another law covering smaller territory. For example, if I wish to get married in an equally absurd position in this respect also. These two cases once being provided for will cover the entire Dominion and the whole question without conflicting with the jurisdiction of a province, for, be it observed, a provincial law cannot override a federal law, which does not pretend to override a corresponding provincial law.
