—Rev. Walter M. Roger occupied the pulpit of Rev. J. Tolmie's church in Brantford yesterday.

—At the annual supper of the Listowel Dairywomen's Association held last week a number of interesting speeches were made, including one by Mr. Hodgson, of this city.

—Mrs. Gatzmeyer, accompanied by four small children, applied to Inspector Bell on Saturday for relief. She was referred to the London township authorities.

She was tendered a farewell at the residence of Edward Thomas, Dundas street east, on Friday evening, when a large circle of friends took occasion to bid good-bye and wish prosperity to their departing friend.

—Driving at a rapid rate over the principal crossings of the city while people are passing is of frequent occurrence. On Saturday evening a number of pedestrians at Dundas and Richmond streets barely succeeded in getting out of the way of a team which was being driven northward at a rapid rate. A policeman was standing near by but made no effort to stop the driver. This practice of fast driving over crossings, especially at night, is a dangerous one, and should be stopped.

—A service of song heralded the opening of the new organ yesterday at the Wellington Street Methodist Church. A choir of nearly 50 voices participated in the musical celebration, conducted by the organist, Mr. Rosalie Pockels, and large congregations were present both morning and evening. The cost of the new organ is \$1,985, which, with the alterations rendered necessary in the gallery, makes a total of about \$2,220. About \$500 was raised by the congregation yesterday, through donations and collections, in addition to the previously subscribed sum of \$1,567, bringing the fund close to the total. During the year the church trustees have been very active in paying off the debt of the church. A grand concert will be held next month to further assist in liquidating the organ debt.

Christian Endeavor Anniversary.
 The fourth anniversary of the Christian Endeavor Society of King Street Presbyterian Church was celebrated yesterday by special services, conducted by Rev. J. Tolmie, of Brantford. The pulpit and organ were tastefully decorated with flowers. In the morning the preacher took as the foundation of his remarks Acts i, 8: "And ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth." After preaching his discourse with an able argument illustrative of the wisdom of obeying Christ's last command the speaker pointed out that obedience made it imperative on the part of Christians to have their every day lives in accordance with their testimony. It did not matter much, he said, how eloquently a man or woman prayed or spoke if his or her life was not Christian. The testimony for Christ secured a growth in grace for themselves and the edification of those who heard their testimony. The speaker referred kindly to the Christian Endeavor Society of the church, and urged its members to begin their witness-bearing for Christ at home, then to extend it to the church and afterwards to the whole world. They should have a higher motive for estimating than merely their pledge of loyalty to the society; it would be loyalty to Christ. It was by the way Christians lived and worked that the world would be won for Christ. To reflect Christ's character in every action of their lives was the speaker concluded, a motto to be copied by every professing Christian. In the evening Mr. Tolmie delivered a discourse on Joseph and his brethren, taking as his text Genesis xxxvii, 12-26. The rendering by the choir of "Gloria" (Mozart's Twelfth Mass) and "Abide With Me," was a pleasant feature of the services. The church was crowded both morning and evening. An "At Home" will be held in the church this evening. Rev. J. Tolmie, of Brantford, will be present and deliver an address.
