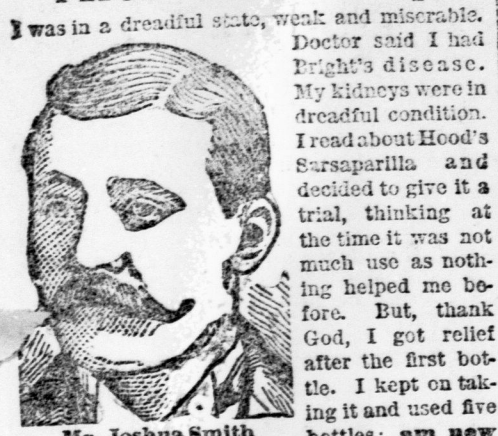

Montreal, Aug. 23.—Five hundred miles through an almost uninhabited country, covered by pathless forests and watered by swift rivers—that is the canoe trip which two ladies and three children started on this morning.
