

WESTERN ONTARIO.

Essex Man Robbed of \$1,000 While Asleep.

Borden Hoodlums Again Destroying Mr. Richardson's Property.

An Alleged Whisky Detective Mobbed—Cagaga Asks Cash—The Alvin-Karpis Gang.

BRANT.

The Brantford police have entered upon a regular campaign against liquor selling on Saturday night and Sunday.

The Brantford Courier says: "It was rumored on Monday that a settlement had been reached in the case of Wilkes vs. Osborne, but although it was said an arrangement was nearly arrived at, the latest rumor is to the effect that the suit will now go on at the approaching assizes. It is claimed that defendant, as president of the Cordero Company, purchased 100 shares from his associate, John Harris, at \$130 each, and that he is now seeking to have him declared as agent at the time and to recover on their shares the difference between \$130 and \$200, the stock already sold for \$200, of the old company, \$74,000, was held as follows: G. H. Wilkes, 100 shares; R. S. Schell, 40 shares; W. Watt, sen., 100 shares; F. Chalmers, 100 shares; G. D. C. Edwards, 30 shares; John Harris, 50 shares; Howell estate, 50 shares; and the defendant, J. K. Osborne, 100 shares. The suit is arousing a good deal of interest."

ELGIN.

One of the oldest residents of St. Thomas passed away Wednesday morning in person of Mrs. Susan Henderson, wife of A. Henderson, sen. The deceased was a daughter of the late Samuel Cole, farmer, Yarmouth. She was twice married, her first husband being the late Geo. Summers, farmer, Yarmouth. She was married to A. Henderson, sen., about 20 years ago. Mrs. Henderson leaves, besides her husband, two children—one daughter, Mrs. S. H. Pavey, by her first husband, and one son, C. H. Henderson, of the Detroit News, by her second. Mrs. Peter Couser, St. Thomas; Mrs. Brannen, Walkerton; Mrs. Morris, Tyrone; Mrs. Badger, Mount Brydges; and Mrs. Clark, of California, are sisters of the deceased. Her brothers are Messrs. Thomas, John and Samuel Cole, of St. Thomas; William, of Yarmouth, and Matthew, of Springfield, Mo.

W. F. Luton, deputy reeve of Yarmouth, will be a candidate for the reeve.

ESSEX.

The bylaw granting a franchise to the Ontario Natural Gas Company to pipe the streets of Windsor has been given first reading by the Windsor City Council.

Tuesday was the day for Windsor newspaper transactors, W. M. Boomer, to assume office, but he did not do so. The city council held a secret session on his bonds and decided, it is said, that they were not up to the requirements.

The value of the property in Windsor exempt from taxation amounted to \$365,075. The population, as shown by the assessment roll, is 10,727.

"Who will be license inspector for North Essex?" is the question now before the people of Windsor. No appointment has been made as yet. Mr. Castner had been agent some years, but the late Mr. Elliott, but he lost his chance of succeeding to the inspectorship by alleged acceptance of money presents from the hotel-keepers.

Charles Lafave, of Ruscom Station, reports that he was robbed of \$1,000 while on a train between Detroit and Toledo. He had been out in Ohio speculating in timber, and was robbed of the money while he slept.

HAMILTON.

At the second day's session of the Fall Assizes at Cayuga Tuesday the grand jury returned a true bill against Tindale for felony. In the case of the township of Meillon vs. Galbraith—an action against a former clerk and treasurer for the return of a minute book said to have been in his possession, and possession on the collector's rolls—judgment was given against the township with costs. Corning vs. Corning, alimony, settled out of court; \$100 for plaintiff. Beaver vs. G. T. R. non-suit. Edie vs. McCrae, settled out of court.

KENT.

The London wreckers who swept like a cyclone over Mr. Richardson's premises at the foot of the East last spring, burning his buildings and destroying his fences, have broken out again, cutting and wrecking his fences, and are simply a public enemy. The course Mr. Richardson has publicly advocated concerning the management of Government lands. Point aux Pins comprises about 4,000 acres, 500 of which is claimed by the Dominion as ordnance lands. Encroachments upon the lands from time to time have become a public nuisance, and the victim of these reported attacks has incurred displeasure by occasional adverse criticism through the newspapers.

An Alvin-Karpis dispatch says that Mr. Cates, banker, whose estate is in liquidation, was on Monday arrested on a warrant issued on complaint of Jas. Rail. Bail was immediately furnished by W. H. Pray, and Mr. Cates released. An investigation is being held at once. The charge is not definitely given, but it is understood that Mr. Rail believes he has discovered one of the part of Mr. Cates that constitute offenses against the law. The latter's friends are confident that the investigation will clear him of all suspicion.

MIDDLESEX.

The Canada Methodist Church at Glenora is roofed, and rapid progress is making towards its completion.

Mr. A. Sinclair, of Lobo, Ont., was the guest of Messrs. McKellar Brothers for some days this week. He left by Thursday's express for the west, where he will spend some three or four weeks visiting different sections of Manitoba and the Territories. [Fort William Journal.]

OXFORD.

An alleged whisky detective named Sayman received a severe punishment in Norwich Monday night. It had been rumored about town during the day that he was on his way to the town, and a small mob was organized to receive him. He was found hiding near the station. A fight was at once commenced. Sayman managed to escape and was driven off, but was soon overtaken by another group. He was forced out of the buggy, whereupon he drew a revolver and threatened to shoot his pursuers. The weapon was snatched from his hand and he was severely dealt with. The mob left him in a backshop near by, in what they supposed a dying condition. A rescue party was organized to administer a dose of tar and feathers, but their plans were frustrated by the timely arrival

of a rescue party under the leadership of Rev. W. Kesteven. The occurrence is accounted for by the fact that a large number of convictions have recently been made in the neighborhood.

PERTH.

The will of the late Dr. Hugh Nicol, of Listowel, has been probated at Stratford. He left an estate of \$81,353.

Rev. George Chrysal, formerly of Avon-ton, but for the past two years a resident of Stratford, has received the appointment of Division Court clerk at Beeton, Simcoe county, and leaves for his new home next week.

There were registered with City Clerk Lang, Stratford, during October, 3 births, 8 marriages and 6 deaths. This is a very small registration, and shows that the provisions of the Registration Act are not being complied with.

A branch of the Emerald Beneficial Association will be organized at Baden on Saturday by Messrs. J. J. Hagarty and E. A. Kennedy, of Stratford.

WATERLOO.

At Galt on Monday Harry, son of Henry Hancock, was badly hurt by falling from the balcony of the stairs in the ward school. He was sliding down and lost his hold and fell a considerable distance, striking his head on the floor. He was taken home unconscious, but soon recovered. He is improving now, though his head is badly bruised.

The new building intended for the Old Ladies' Home at Galt is rapidly approaching completion, and will be ready for occupation by December. The cost will be in the neighborhood of \$4,000.

A deputation of the traveling dairy from the Guelph Agricultural College will exhibit dairy utensils, make butter, test milk and deliver lectures at the following places in Waterloo county: Linwood on Nov. 3, Wellesley 4, Elmira 7, Winterbourne 8, Bloomingdale 9, and Berlin on Nov. 10. Great interest is being manifested in these approaching meetings.

OTHER WESTERN ONTARIO NOTES.

The Methodist Church in Orangeville had a narrow escape from being burned the other day by an incendiary firing a large shed adjoining. The flying embers ignited the roof of the church. The firemen, however, extinguished the blaze with great difficulty, but later on the spire was seen to throw out a lurid light, and the fire-fighters had great difficulty in reaching the blaze.

A TRAVELER'S TERRIBLE FATE!

Attacked by Eagles After Having Fallen Over a Precipice.

OGDEN, Utah, Nov. 2.—J. F. Barklow, of Brooklyn, N. Y., who with Frank M. Conroy, of Brooklyn, left here two weeks ago to examine the territory of the extinct cliff-dwellers along the edge of the extinct volcano, yesterday. He tells a terrible story of Conroy's awful death.

"We were picking our way along the ledge of what looked like a bottomless gorge," said Barklow. "The path was a narrow one, a perpendicular rock wall on one side and the bleak precipice towering below us on the other. Our burro became fractious and knocked Conroy off the ledge and fell with him. A hundred feet or so down the precipice, flat level part of the rock jutting and framed part of platform. On the outer edge of this the burro struck and rebounded slightly, just as Frank in his descent struck on the animal's side, thus saving him from instant death. Frank dropped back upon the platform. I leaped over and back onto the ledge. It was some time before he was able to answer. He was lying on a small ledge of rock with several ribs broken and one arm smashed. Then I heard a shriek from him, and glancing down saw the beginning of a terrible combat. Above him and to one side was a large nest with several young birds in it, and two eagles, suspecting him of an attack on their young swooped down on him from different directions and struck him with bills and claws. The great bird at last succeeded in what they wished to accomplish—they scratched his face with their horrible claws. Then with a scream of triumph they followed Frank over to the edge of the shelf and far down into the abyss."

Mr. Barklow reached Ogden more dead than alive, and left for the east last night.
