Sparks from the Wire.

The flurry in African stocks is about over. Prof. Clark, of Trinity College, Toronto, is seriously ill. The fact that not a single member of the imperial fetes at Woerth, is causing comment in Germany.

The French prisoners were massacred by the Hovas before the French army reduced the capital of Madagascar. The English missionaries had a narrow escape.

The Czar has granted a pension of 5,000 roubles annually to Prince Lobanoff Rostovsky, minister of foreign affairs, for services rendered the state during the recent visit to France.

The Ontario Government will send a man to investigate a series of mysterious fires in Kent and Elgin counties. A number of barns in the townships of Tilbury North and Rodney have been burned down by incendiaries.

All the foreign ministers at Seoul agree in denouncing the Japanese for the murder of the Korean queen. The Japanese minister is held responsible. The Russian minister has demanded the restoration of the king to power.

Premier Greenway, of Manitoba, has announced that the Local Government will demand compensation, either in cash or in other lands, for 35,337 acres of swamp land which Minister T. M. Daly says it is impossible to transfer from the Federal to the local authorit-ies, they having been disposed of by the Dominion Government. There is indig-nation in Manitoba over this disposal of Provincial belongings.

TEN CHILDREN PERISH.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 22.-The Children's Home at Stargard, in the Sajonschek district of Polish Russia, has been destroyed by fire. Ten children perished in the flames.

LIGHTNING KILLED THE KING. Rome, Oct. 22.-The Don Chissotte Della Mancia (newspaper) announces that the report that King Menelek of Abyssinia has ben killed by a stroke of lightning is officially confirmed. A NEW SEAPORT.

Brussels, Oct. 22.-A decree was signed here yesterday declaring the city to be a seaport. A canal will be constructed at a cost of 5,000,000 francs that will enable vessels of 2,000 tons burden to discharge at the wharves that will be built here.

DOUBLE SUICIDE. Berlin, Oct. 22.-A dispatch from Vienna says that Field Marshal Dunst-Adelshelm and his wife have commit-

ted suicide. The field marshal was 72 years old and his wife 50 years. Their self-destruction is attributed to financial

troubles. STEAMSHIPS COLLIDE.

Sydney, N. S. W., Oct. 22.-The British steamer Indrani has been in collision with the American ship Alameda, from Moodyville. The Alameda was cut down to and below the water's edge, and subsequently grounded in a badly damaged condition. The Indrani was from Tonce, for Port Kembla. The Alameda left Vancouver, B. C., on Aug. 16, for Sydney.

THAT THREATENING MESSAGE London, Oct. 22.-The threatening message sent to Caracas by Lord Salisbury was provoked by Secretary Olney's protesting dispatch upon the Venezuelan matter. Salisbury very curt to Bayard and reminded him that Great Britain was a power in America before the United States was in existence.

MUSSULMANS ATTACK CHRIS-

Constantinople, Oct. 22.-Advices received here from Ismid and Hendek say that the Mussulmans' attacks upon Christians continue. Troops have been hastily dispatched to the scene of the disturbances. According to news re-ceived from Adana and Aleppo revolutionary agents are traversing the country and are enrolling young Armenians, while quantities of arms, ammunition and dynamite are being

smuggled across the frontiers for their ARMAMENT OF THE VICTORIOUS. London, Oct. 22.—The new battleship Victorious, which was launched from the Chatham dockyard on Saturday afternoon, is 390 feet long and has 75 feet beam and 27 1-2 feet draft. Her armament will consist of four breechloading 46-ton guns, twelve six-inch quick-firing guns, sixteen 12-pounders, with several 8-pounder Hotchkiss guns and Maxims. She will also carry four submerged torpedo tubes and one above water. The ship was launched in the presence of a distinguished company of spectators. She was christened by Mrs. Goschen, wife of the First

Lord of the Admiralty. PLUNKETT'S PLAN.

London, Oct. 22.-John Redmond has written to Hon. H. C. Plunkett, stating that he is willing to co-operate with Mr. Plunkett to secure the appointment of the commission recently suggested by the latter, but adds that he is not sanguine of the result. Mr. Plunkett, who is a Conservative, represents the south division of the county of Dublin in the House of Commons A short time ago he appealed to all the political parties in Ireland to sink all bitterness and differences for their country's good. He suggested that during the Parliamentary recess a committee, to be composed of three Anti-Parnellites, two Parnellites, two Irish Unionists, and any practical Irishman whose opinions are valuable, be invited to join in the discussion of matters of pressing need.

LETTER FROM STOKE'S BROTHER. London, Oct. 22.-A man named Thos. Bradley, who until recently was employed by the authorities of the Congo Bavarian royal family was invited to the Free State, has just returned from West Africa bearing a letter from the brother of Stokes, the English trader. who was hanged by Capt. Lothaire, of the Belgian service, after a brief trial by court martial, at which the captain is alleged to have formed the whole court. The dead man's brother says that Bishop Taylor, the American missionary at Stanley Pool, told him that Capt. Lothaire had long been jealous of Stokes on account of the latter's influence with the natives. Bradley said that Capt. Lothaire caused an American overseer to be bound to a tree and then he lashed the bound man with he sword, cutting the clothes from his back and wounding him terribly. Brad-ley, who claims he was an eye-witness of this outrage, says that the American died two days later.

BETTER TERMS FOR ARMENIANS. Constantinople, Oct. 22.-A summary of the reforms that it has been decided shall be made in the administration of Armenia has been communicated to the Turkish newspapers. The principal points are formation of a mixed body of police and gendarmerie in each vilayet, the inspection of the prisons by judicial inspectors, the collection of taxes by an official elected by the inhabitants yearly, and an inquiry by Constantinople officials into any abuse. The general situation here is apparently unchanged. The main question now is the issue of a firman embodying the agreement between the powers and the Porte. The ambassadors find that the Sultan is very unwilling to take

this step. Nevertheless, it is satisfactory to note that there are no symp-toms of special inquietude at the granting of the reforms by the Porte.

READY TO ARBITRATE. London, Oct. 22.-In view of the many reports in circulation regarding the attitude of Great Britain towards Venezuela, the following official announcement is made:

"In consequence of Venezuela not offering an apology or reparation for the Uruan accident, the Marquis of Salisbury has taken steps to inform her as to what reparation Great Britain requires. But, as relations between the two countries have been broken off for some years, the communication was not sent through the direct diplomatic channel. As the document has not reached its destination, it is not considered desirable to give details of its contents. But it is couched in forcible terms, and points out that Great Britain will not permit Venezuela to overstep the boundaries marked by the course of the Rivers Cuyune and Amaura; but is willing that the question of the other disputed territory should be submitted to arbitra-

CHURCH UNITY.

London, Oct. 22.-The Archbishop of Canterbury announces that a Pan-Anglican Conference will be convened in Lambeth Palace, the Archepiscopal residence, in 1897. It is 30 years since the last conference of the kind was

held. Trial of Mrs. Kellar, at Oswego, en the Charge of Murder.

Mysterious Case-Albert Kempthorne Meets His Fate in the Widow's House.

Oswego, N. Y., Oct. 22.-The trial of Mrs. Harriet Kellar on an indictment charging her with murder in the first degree was begun here yesterday. The accused is a widow of 38 years and has three sons aged respectively

17, 15 and 11. Albert Kompthorne, the victim, was a tall, manly looking fellow aged 32 years. His home was near Toronto, Canada, but he had been in the town of New Haven, this county, for twe years engaged in peddling meat. He was a constant caller at the widow's home, and on several occasions she

went driving with him.

Mrs. Kellar worked for neighboring farmers, and on the night of the murder had just returned from a six weeks' term of work with John Smith, who lived but a few miles away. Shortly after midnight Kempthorne called on the widow. He was intoxicated. She alleges that she refused him admittance but that he raised the window, entered and assaulted her, though there was no evidence of a

struggle. When found Kempthorne was lying on the bed, his head toward the foot of the bed which was next the window. The contents of a shotgun had been emptied into his side and the ridges had ben struck with the pistol's hammer and had failed to explode, probably before the shotgun was used. No motive for the crime is known unless it be the fact that Kempthorne was about to leave the place, never to return. He told this to the widow when he applied for admission. A bottle filled with whisky had dropped from his clothing, which was foided on the window sill.
