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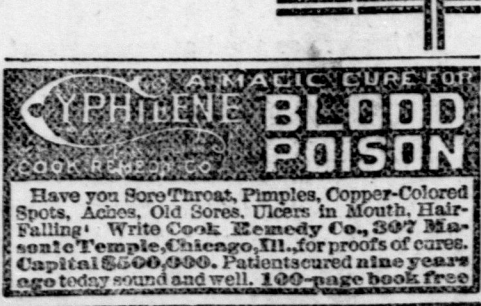

The following resolution was moved by Canon Richardson, seconded by Archdeacon Davis, "That the sincere sympathy of this association be and is hereby tendered to our fellow-Christians of the Methodist communion in the serious loss sustained by them in the destruction by fire of the Queen's Avenue Church last night, and they pray that the disaster may, in God's providence, be overruled for good." Carried unanimously.

The subject of special Lenten services was then taken up, and, after discussion, it was agreed that a series of special services be held in each church during the first week in Lent, commencing on Ash Wednesday.
