A Shortage of \$1,000 in a Brantford Institution.

The Godefrich Stage Taking a Holiday—A Lanes Church Narrowly Escapes Burning—A \$40 Fine for Violation of the Licence Act.

BRANT.

A wedding took place at Brantford Wednesday afternoon, the contracting party being Miss Belle Ross, daughter of D. Ross, and Capt. George A. Symes, of Sarnia.

In the course of his recent visit to Brantford Rev. Dr. Klug, of Manitoba College, raised \$400 in aid of that institution. Laurence Scholten, a resident of Onondaga, has been arrested on a charge of perjury in connection with a liquor case in which he was a witness.

Superintendent Stephenson, of the Grand Trunk, writes expressing the hope that arrangements will be made for running Pullman trains for Buffalo via Brantford before the spring time-table is issued.

Mr. Macdonald, of Lucan, has been appointed English master in the Brantford Collegiate Institute at a salary of \$1,000 per annum.

At the Brantford Police Court a young man named Pat McDonald has been given two months' imprisonment for stealing crockery from his employer, R. R. Harris. The Brantford Railway Company has applied for and received a further extension of time for commencing operations until April 1.

A shortage of \$1,000 has been discovered in the accounts of a clerk in one of the local institutions. It is probable that he will be able to make the amount good.

Geo. Hayden, sen., painter, Paris, complains of the lenient punishment meted out to a young man who had been a boarder in his house and against whom two charges of larceny were made. The party in question was allowed to go under suspended sentence, his father paying for all goods stolen. He thinks the circumstances of the case called for more exemplary punishment.

At the Windsor Police Court on Friday, John Lewis, Isaac Lair, Thomas Britton, Jun., and Frank Powell were fined \$7.40 each, John Boyles \$7.85 and William McAffrey \$10 for being drunk and disorderly on a Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway train on Christmas Eve. J. W. Hanna, who appeared for the prisoners, gave notice of appeal, claiming that the offense was not committed in Sandwich East.

The Michigan Central Railroad have decided not to carry any more corpses where death resulted from diphtheria. A farmer named Brock, of Sandwich East, from both of his feet while going to Windsor with a load of wood on Friday.

The tug International, which was burned at Amherstburg some time ago, has been raised. Mayor McMullen, of Amherstburg, has received a letter, on behalf of the late opponent, asking him to disclaim his seat and save expense. McMullen states that he will fight the matter to the bitter end.

Frank Phelan, con. 8, Tilbury North, was drawing logs Friday afternoon, when one of the horses kicked him in the face, breaking his upper jaw on both sides and knocking out two of his lower teeth and all the upper ones. He was alone, and being knocked senseless, lay in the woods until found by some other man working not far distant.

A little son of Hugh Polson, of the Windsor Bank of Commerce, fell on a clothesline Thursday and seriously injured one of his eyes. He will lose the sight of it.

Charles A. Riddle and Miss Lillian Skelton, of St. Thomas, were united in marriage Wednesday night at the residence of the bride's mother, Eliza street. A gate is being put in the Ross street crossing of the M. C. R., St. Thomas, and electric goods, worked automatically by moving trains, will soon be placed at all street crossings.

The remains of Mrs. Henry Kirkland, who died in Toronto Thursday morning, were interred in the St. Thomas cemetery on Saturday.

Wm. Dougherty, an employee of Karm's organ factory, Woodstock, fell off a sleigh while going to work Friday afternoon, and broke his arm.

A public meeting of those interested in the building of a public hospital at Woodstock was held Thursday night. Rev. J. L. Harting, the chief promoter of this charitable work, was called to the chair, and speeches were made by many prominent citizens, all favoring the erection of a hospital. A subscription list was opened, and \$1,625 subscribed. It is proposed to raise \$10,000 in this manner.

He had been around mind for some time, wandering about the country, and he arrived at Ingersoll Friday from Woodstock.
