SEVERE WEATHER IN EUROPE.

Schools Closed on Account of Cold in St. Petersburg.

Terrible Blizzards Reported From Austria and Russia—Nine People Frozen to Death.

London, Jan. 6.—Severe cold has suddenly set in throughout Europe. In England it is accompanied by a northerly wind, amounting to a gale over the channel. At Dover a boat was capsized, four persons being drowned and probably other accidents will be reported.

On the continent the weather is still more severe. Snow has fallen as far south as Naples; and in St. Petersburg the cold is so intense that the police in the streets have had to be frequently relieved and the schools to be closed. At Moscow the temperature is 30 degrees below zero Fahrenheit. Tremendous gales are blowing over the Adriatic. Terrible blizzards are reported from Austria and Southern Russia, extinguishing signal lights and resulting in the derailing of the Orient express at Alasu.

The storm caused a collision between passenger trains at Mikola, near Szatmar, Hungary, six persons being killed. Nine people were frozen to death on a high road in Transylvania. Odessa is completely snowed under. The harbor is frozen over and trains are unable to enter or depart in consequence of the drifts.

Paris, Jan. 6.—Severe cold is reported throughout France and Italy. A foot of snow fell at Marseilles last evening, and the mercury shows 18 degrees of frost in Paris today. There have been a number of deaths in the streets. Trains from a long distance are greatly delayed.

Snow has fallen even in Southern Italy, and the city of Rome and surrounding country are snow-clad for the first time in many years. Crowds assembled on the Pincio to witness the rare panorama.

LONDON UNDER A NEW REGIME

Only Four of Last Year's Aldermen Will Gather Around the Board.

Mayor Rumball Re-Elected by a Handsome Majority—The Water Commissioners Resume Their Seats—Anti-Hospital Bylaw Snowed Under—Personnel of the New Council—Figures That Tell the Story.

Such are the results of the municipal elections of 1901, the first year in which the city council, reduced in number from 18 to 12—has been elected by the general vote of the people. The warmth that was gradually becoming aroused as the campaign progressed, was not evident during the day. It was very quiet. An opinion that the vote being polled was small, was frequently expressed, and the supposition was substantiated when all the returns were made. For the mayoralty contest the vote was remarkably small, which may possibly be explained by the non-acquaintance with the combined ballot. For the mayoralty contest in 1898 there were 6,785 votes cast; in 1899, 5,195; last year, 5,067; and this year only 4,948.

The personnel of the council has

been radically changed, only four of last year's aldermen being re-elected.

Mayor Rumball's re-election, with the splendid majority of 1,000 over Ex-Ald. Douglass, and 885 over all, was not unexpected.

Among those of the council, Ald. Hume B. Cronyn heads the poll, an honor which his courtesy and marked capability will no doubt justify.

Ald. Andrew Greenlees is also a bar-rister, older than the gentleman who topped the list and versed in the lore and ways of the council chamber. Year before last he sat at the aldermanic board as the representative of the sixth ward. He is a worthy as well as clearly a popular citizen.

Ald. J. H. A. Beattie completes the trinity of barristers who were one, two and three at the top of the list.

And Ald. Parnell—what can be said of him that is not already known? After two years retirement, he looms before the public eye again. Large experience of things municipal is his. Possessed also of a deep sense of his duty to the city, with the practical ability necessary to advance his ideas, he will be welcomed to the council by all public-spirited citizens.

Ald. Winnett is again elected, and comes to the council with a mind fresh with memories of last year's work. Ald. Cl. T. Campbell enters the council chamber for the first time as an alderman, his previous official training having been acquired as school trustee and a member of the board of health. While on both these boards he gave to the consideration of the matters that arose his marked ability. Ald. Cooper is triumphant again, thus demonstrating that his power lies not in his favorite ward alone, but in the city at large.

BOERS LED BY COLONIALS!

Two Hundred of Them Said To Be Making for Gray's Pass.

Christian Dewet Working Up Sympathy for the Burghers in South Germany—Arrival of More Canadian Soldiers at Halifax.

London, Jan. 8.—Two hundred Boers, who are reported to have been detached from a commando in the neighborhood of Fraserburg, are making for Gray's Pass, intending to thereby enter the western province. The fact that they have chosen this pass is regarded as proof that they are led by colonials.

BRITISH LOSSES.

The war office has issued a table of the war losses to the end of 1900. The total casualties of every kind were 51,687, but owing to the fact that a majority of the men invalided home have recovered and rejoined their commands, the total reduction of the forces was 14,820. There are also missing and prisoners seven officers and 598 men. The number of invalids who left the service and are unfit for duty is 1,570.

AN AFRIKANDER DEPUTATION.

At a meeting of Afrikaner members of the Cape Parliament, at Cape Town yesterday, it was resolved to send Messrs. J. K. Merriman, former treasurer of Cape Colony; J. W. Sauer, former commissioner of public works; and J. H. Hofmeyer, to England, to represent the state of affairs in South Africa to the government, parliament and people of Great Britain.

STIRRING UP SYMPATHY.

Berlin, Jan. 8.—Christian Dewet, nephew of the Boer general, is making speeches in South Germany in behalf of the Boer cause and arousing great sympathy. The meeting which he addressed adopted resolutions protesting vigorously against the overthrow of the two republics, the reso-

THE ROSLYN CASTLE.
Halifax, N. S., Jan. 7.—Midnight—No sign of the Roslyn Castle yet. This is the vessel bearing the second Canadian contingent from South Africa.

WEDDING MAY HAVE TO WAIT.

Duke of Saxe-Weimar's Death May Delay Wilhelmina's Marriage.

Over 100 People Saved From Wreck and Pirates in Magellan Straits.

London, Jan. 8.—A dispatch from The Hague says: Though the grand duke of Saxe-Weimar's death was expected, the news, nevertheless, caused a considerable shock at the palace, where all the blinds were immediately lowered. Six weeks' deep court mourning has been ordered, which may lead to the postponement of the queen's marriage, though some authorities declare the contrary.

The second chamber has discussed and passed the bills relating to the queen's marriage, and the status of Duke Henry. The first, giving permission for the marriage, was passed by 79 to 10. Then Duke Henry's naturalization was accepted, and last, by 81 votes to 7, the duke's income in case of the queen's death was decided upon. After voting a grant for naval expenditure the chamber adjourned until Feb. 12.

102 PERSONS SAVED.

The little Spanish steamship San Augustin has been wrecked on a small islet in Smith channel, Straits of Magellan. The British steamship Coya saved the passengers. Four crew, 102 in number, from attack by the pirates of the coast, and landed all hands at Punta Arenas.

MAY COME HERE.
The Molokanen, a sect numbering 40,000, whose founders removed in 1840 from various parts of Russia to the Caucasus, and whose delegates have just brought glowing reports from the Donkubors, or Russian Quakers, in Canada, contemplate emigrating to America. The sect secured state lands in the Caucasus almost rent free, but recently the Russian government announced that the rents would be increased three or four fold. Now the Molokanen are petitioning the government to restore the former rentals or to permit emigration.

COLOMBIA AND VENEZUELA.
Kingston, Jamaica, Jan. 8.—Letters received here from Panama say the relations between Colombia and Venezuela are much strained in consequence of the latter's connivance with the revolutionists in the former country. The activity of the rebels only restrains Colombia from taking warlike measures against Venezuela, and even now Colombian troops are being moved to the border. The rebels (Continued on page 5.)
