Chicago, May 24.-John Alexander Dowie, "overseer of the Christian Catholic Church," was arrested here today pursuant to the action of the coroner's jury, which had declared him "criminally responsible" for the death of Mrs. Emma Lucy Judd, H. Worthington Judd, a disciple of Dowie and husband of the alleged victim, also was arrested, having appeared at the criminal court building in company with Dowie. Both men were taken before Judge Tuley, who admitted them to bail on \$10,000. Henrikka Bratsch and Mary B. Speicher, "maternity" nurses, who are said to have attended Mrs.

Judd, were arrested last night and later released under \$5,000 bonds Mrs. Judd died a week ago at Dowie's "Zion," after 16 hours of suffering. Her infant also died, and on expert medical testimony before the corner it was shown that the ordinary treatment given by medical practitioners would have saved her life easily.

The proceedings at the Judd inquest occupied the entire afternoon. Six witnesses were examined, the testimony of Overseer Speicher and Mrs. Bratsch consuming hearly and the time. The other witnesses were Jesse E. Daniels, janitor of the South Side Zion tabernacle, Mrs. Bell, Mrs. Lotty
